KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

Mary Thibodaux, a little girl of about 15 years of age, was struck by lightning while at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Boy Davis, about three miles from Abita Springs, Thursday at 4 o'clock. Others were sitting in the room at the time, but no one else was seriously hurt. Miss Thibodaux was instantly killed. Her clothing was set on fire and water was poured on her to extinguish the flames. Two dogs lying under the house were killed by the same bolt. The lightning seems to have run down the chimney and not to have done much damage to the house. Mary was a sister to the little boy who is often seen selling candy in Abita and Covington.

Lightning is playing sad pranks in the neighborhood of Covington lately. Houses, human beings and animals seem to be equally in danger when the flashes split the clouds. At about 2:30 o'clock Friday evening three horses belonging to Mr. Preston Burns were struck, two being killed outright. The other will not live. Allen P. Burns, his son, who lives in the stable at the time sitting in a surry, was thrown out, but not injured. Two pigeons and a rat were killed at the same time.
