Covington, La., Oct. 3, 1912. Having had no quorum on October 1st, regular meeting night, the meeting was called on above date with the following members present: F. G. Marrero, Mayor; Aldermen P. J. LaCroix, Leon Hebert, Emile Beaucoudray, D. I. Addison, Maurice Planché, L. A. Perreand. Absent, none.

SCHOOL BOARD

(Continued from page 1.) I wrote the following letter: Covington, La., Sept. 21, 1912. Miss M. Martin, Ramsey, La.

Dear Miss Martin:—Mr. Adams and Mr. Jarrell have both just been in my office and I have had a talk with them regarding the claim that there is a "colored blood" in Mr. Jarrell's children. They both claim that charge is positively untrue. I shall have to therefore ask the patrons of your school to produce proofs of their statements, and if they do so, to the satisfaction of the parish school board, I will ask the children in question to remain from school; but if they do not produce the proof their children will be permitted to attend the school.

The parish school board will meet on Saturday, October 5, 1912. You have my permission to receive these children in your school until further notice from me, or the parish board. With kind regards, I beg to remain, Cordially, ELMER E. LYON, Superintendent.

I also wrote the following letter to Mr. Eugene Laird, trustee of the Ramsey school. Covington, La., Sept. 21, 1912. Mr. Eugene Laird, Ramsey, La. Dear Sir:—Mr. Adams and Mr. Jarrell have just been to see me and they have charged that there is colored blood in their children's veins. I shall have to therefore ask the patrons of the Ramsey school to produce the proof that there is, for I shall hold that they are white until I am in possession of proof to the contrary.

I wish you would notify the people who complain that they are invited by me to appear before the parish school board in my office on Saturday, October 5, 1912, and lay before the board any facts they desire, bearing upon this question. I am enclosing copy of a letter which I have sent to Miss Martin. With all good wishes for the suc-

cess of the school and hoping all will come out satisfactory, I remain, Very cordially, ELMER E. LYON, Superintendent.

On Monday, September 23, 1912, the patrons of the Ramsey school came to my office to present a protest in person against the three children of Mr. J. S. Jarrell, and a child by the name of McClain attending their school. Those representing the patrons were as follows: Eugene Laird, trustee; Geo. H. Tisdale, R. M. Davis, V. L. D. Laird, P. M. Carpenter, D. M. Loyd, B. M. Stevens.

They also stated that the following who were not present were opposed to these children attending the school: E. B. Pond, James Laird, B. E. Givens and Adam Fortier. After some discussion they agreed to lay the matter over until October 5th, when they would lay their claims before your honorable body for consideration. I therefore wrote the following letter notifying Mr. Jarrell of this decision. Covington, La., Sept. 26, 1912.

Dear Sir:—Permit me to inform you that the question of your children attending the white school at Ramsey is going to be taken before the parish school board at their meeting to be held in my office on Saturday, October 5, 1912, and you are invited to be present. May I request that you have your wife and children present on that day, in order that the board may have all the opportunity possible to make a just decision. Yours very truly, ELMER E. A committee representing the patrons of the Ramsey school appeared before the board and asked that they take steps to prevent the children of Mr. J. S. Jarrell and other good children of Mr. Wash Adams from attending the Ramsey school. The school is situated in this neighborhood, and this committee to justify such a step was their firm conviction that the children in question had negro blood in their veins.

After listening to statements from all present who desired to be heard, a vote was taken, and the matter was carried unanimously. A petition was presented from C. W. Bush and others of the fifth ward asking that a school be reopened at the Simmons Creek neighborhood.

Mr. Kahl stated that the last two years in which a school had been run at the Simmons Creek school they had failed to maintain an average attendance of ten. He stated that he desired to see their school consolidated with the Ramsey school and have a new consolidated school building built half way between the present school buildings. He pointed to a letter from Mr. J. S. Jones stating he found he could not give a clear title to the desired site for the building.

Mr. F. Heintz, Jr., who was present and representing the petitioners, asked if the board would vote to build a consolidated school house midway between the present houses if he would secure the title to desirable piece of land for a building site.

Upon motion of Dr. Pigott and seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, it was voted to instruct the committee appointed at a former meeting, and consisting of Mr. Kahl, the president and secretary of the board, to examine such a site when secured by Mr. Heintz, and if they consider it desirable to secure it for a school building site.

Moved by Mr. Crawford and seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, that additional insurance be placed on the Union Grove school through R. L. Aubert Insurance Agency.

Moved by Dr. Pigott and seconded by Mr. Parker, that new desks be bought for the new Edwards school, received a title to the property.

Moved by Dr. Pigott and seconded by Mr. Davis, that the Superintendent proceed to advertise for bids for the construction of a two-room school house for Lacombe to be made according to the plans and specifications by Jenkins Brothers, architects.

A building committee consisting of Pres. C. A. David, Director John H. Davis and Supt. E. E. Lyon were appointed to act for the board in the matter of receiving bids and awarding contract.

Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Dr. Pigott, that the Superintendent advertise for bids for the construction of a two-room school house at Tallisheek, the same to be built from plans and specifications by Jenkins Brothers. The following building committee was appointed: Messrs. Parker, Kahl, Crawford, Warren Thomas and the Superintendent.

Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Dr. Pigott, that the board appropriate \$100 and specify a book case for the school library at Potosi, Union Grove and Pilgrim Rest schools. The Superintendent acknowledged the receipt of \$10 for the libraries of each of the above mentioned schools.

Moved by Dr. Pigott and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the Superintendent be instructed to secure more desks for such schools as needed them.

A letter from Watkins & Watkins attorneys for L. C. Garber, was read stating that the leaks in the Sildeil school house had been stopped and asked for the balance due Mr. Garber for the construction of the building.

A report was read from Prof. C. E. Hooper stating that he was not able to state whether the work recently done upon the building to stop various leaks had been successful. On motion duly seconded, it was voted to lay the matter over until the next meeting of the board. In the meantime an attempt will be made to find out exactly the result of the repairs on the roof and windows.

The special report of the Superintendent regarding the collection of all money due the school board was received and ordered placed on file. On motion of Mr. Davis and seconded by Mr. Parker, the board expressed itself as being satisfied with the method being used by the Superintendent in making this collection.

The suspending or expelling of members, the rate or amount of fines to be imposed on delinquent members, or for disorderly or unbecoming conduct, in change, alter or amend such by-laws and regulations as it is deemed necessary and its pleasure, to appoint such managers, officers, directors or agents as the interest and business of said association may require.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation or association shall be in the town of Madisonville, in the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana. All legal citations or other legal processes shall be served on the President of this corporation, in case of his absence the Vice President, and in the absence of both the President and Vice President, then said processes shall be served upon the Secretary of this association.

ARTICLE III. The object and purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared to be for the mutual aid and assistance of its members, to pay sick benefits or relief to its members or their families, and to bury its dead, and for that purpose to appropriate, set aside and donate a certain sum of money, and in general to do and perform all acts of a charitable and benevolent nature, that are permitted to be done by corporations of the State of Louisiana, or such laws as may be hereafter enacted.

ARTICLE IV. The affairs of this corporation shall be managed and controlled by five members who shall be the officers of said corporation, to-wit: A President, a Vice President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually on the first day of August of each year. That for the purpose of organization and to carry on the business of this corporation until its annual election of officers, the following named members shall fill said offices and exercise the duties thereof, to-wit: President, Peter Baham; Vice President, C. R. Baham; Secretary, Eugene Cooper; Assistant Secretary, Henry Flot; Treasurer, M. A. Alexius, who shall remain in office until their respective offices until the first day of August A. D. 1913, or until their successors have been duly elected. Upon which date, annually thereafter, the annual election of officers shall be held.

All officers shall be elected by ballot. The person receiving the majority of votes cast shall be declared elected to the offices for which he offered himself. Should there be more than two candidates for the same office, the two receiving the highest number of votes cast shall again be balloted upon, and the one receiving the highest number of votes cast, shall be declared elected. Nominations for office shall be made at the meeting previous to the meeting which the annual election of officers is held, and nominations made at that meeting. All officers elected shall serve only for the unexpired term of said office.

ARTICLE V. Any person to be eligible to membership in this association must be a male over the age of fifteen years and under the age of sixty years, and must be a person of good character. Admission to membership in this association must be by written application, presented to the association thirty days previous to a regular monthly meeting, which application shall be endorsed by two members in good standing, and accompanied by the required, and comply with such other requirements as fixed by and in accordance with the by-laws of this association.

ARTICLE VI. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of this association, to preserve order and insure obedience to the by-laws and regulations of the association, to appoint all committees, to see that all officers and members of committees perform their respective duties to vote on any question only in the event of a tie vote, to renounce the result of all ballots, to decide all points of order, to perform all the duties of his office, to sign all vouchers, orders and other payments drawn upon the Treasurer for money or sums voted, or necessary to pay benefits, to sign all papers, documents, etc., and to do all things necessary to be done by the provisions of the by-laws, or that may be required by this association.

ARTICLE VII. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to render assistance to the President, and in his absence or inability to act, to perform all the acts required to be done by the President, and to do all other acts that may be required hereafter by the by-laws or orders of this association.

In the absence of both, the President and Vice President, the members present at any regular meeting, or called meeting, shall appoint from among their number a President "pro tem" to preside over said meeting.

ARTICLE VIII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to preside at all meetings of this association, to keep a true and correct record of all meetings of this association, to attend to all the correspondence of this association, and keep such books, papers and documents appertaining to his office in his possession, and to keep the same in good order, to collect all fees, dues, assessments and fines due the association, and to issue his receipt therefor, and to turn over, as the same are collected, to the Treasurer, and take his receipt therefor to counter-sign all vouchers, orders, checks, etc., for the payment of any monies of this association, and in general do such other acts, and perform such other duties that may be prescribed by the by-laws of this association.

The Assistant Secretary shall render such service to the Secretary as it may be deemed advisable or necessary, and in the absence of the Secretary, to act in his place and stead at all meetings, and to do all acts that the said Secretary is required to do, and in general, to do and perform such other duties as the association may from time to time require to be done, or by the by-laws of this association.

ARTICLE IX. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to attend all meetings of this association, to receive all monies collected by the Secretary or Assistant Secretary, and to give his receipt therefor. He shall keep a true and correct account of all monies received and expended by him, he shall

not pay out any monies of this association, except upon presentation of a voucher, order or check, properly signed by the President, and counter-signed by the Secretary, he shall deposit in bank, in the name of this association all monies received by him for its account, as soon as received by him. He shall keep a duplicate deposit showing all monies deposited by him to the credit of this association, which deposit slips shall be evidence of such deposits, and said deposit slips shall be kept on file in his office and be subjected to inspection by the President or any member in good standing representing the President, he shall do and perform such other duties that may be from time to time prescribed by the by-laws of this association.

ARTICLE X. Any officer of this association, who may be guilty of non-performance of duty, or for unbecoming conduct, may be impeached and removed from office, and may be suspended and expelled from this association. All impeachment proceedings shall be conducted at a regular meeting of this association, and no officer shall be removed from office, except by a majority vote of all members present and voting at such meeting. In case of tie vote, the President, or other presiding officer, shall have the right to cast the deciding vote. As to the member in good standing representing the President, he shall do and perform such other duties that may be prescribed by the by-laws of this association.
