W. J. POITEVENT DIES SUDDENLY

WELL-KNOWN LUMBERMAN AND FINANCIER EXPIRES IN OFFICE HERE.

Highly Cultured and Richly Endowed. He Was Welcomed in Many Lands.

New Orleans, Dec. 10.—Wm. J. Poitevent, one of the most popular and admirable men of the city and State, who counted his friends by the hundreds and was popular with all the cultivated society people of the city, died suddenly yesterday afternoon in the ambulance of the Tour Infirmario, where he was being taken by the advice of his physicians, after having been suddenly attacked by heart trouble in his office in the Liverpool and London and Globe insurance building.

Mr. Poitevent was born at Pearlington, Miss. He was the son of the late Capt. John Poitevent and was 47 years old. His father was well known as the founder and president of the Poitevent Lumber Co., and head of the East Louisiana Railroad.

Mr. Poitevent was educated at Virginia Military Institute and at Centenary College, Jackson, La. He was never married. He was a popular man socially and was a dilettante in music and art. Having a fine baritone voice he delighted his friends with his singing and had studied under the best teachers here and in New York and Europe.

Mr. Poitevent was a member of the Boston and Picwick Clubs and the Knickerbocker Club in New York. He was one of the leading financial men of the city and State, and was Vice President of the Commercial-Germania Trust and Savings Bank and of the Bogalusa Improvement Company.

Mr. Poitevent was a member of one of the leading Louisiana families. His father was a pioneer in industry and finance, and the family is connected by marriage and blood with the leading people of the city and State.

The funeral will be held Wednesday at Pearlington, Miss., the burial being in the family cemetery, where the members of the family are all interred, near the old homestead where they were all so well known and respected.

TWO PLUNGE SKYSCRAPING BUILDINGS

DROP OF TWENTY-TWO STORIES BREAKS MAN'S ANKLE.

Girl Jumps Six Floors and Succeeds in Death Plan.

New York, Dec. 9.—A girl jumped out of a six-story window here today and was instantly killed. A man fell twenty-two stories and suffered only a broken ankle.

Fannie Blumel, a pretty sixteen-year-old girl, committed suicide by leaping from the roof of the six-story tenement at 115 East 104th street. The young girl was not known in the house from which she jumped, nor could the police find anyone who had an inkling of her motive for suicide.

Nicolo Norbio is in Bellevue Hospital with a broken ankle tonight. Nothing happened to him except that he dropped 22 stories through the frame work of a steel building which is being built at 11 East 26th street, by the Standard Arch Co.

As the hoist gathered downward headway, Nicolo's hair rose under his hat and, he said afterward, he tried to yell, but his tongue wouldn't speak. The hoist shot down like a plummet and Nicolo clung to it and tried to frame a prayer.

It struck with terrific force in a great sand pile in the basement. The sand was soft but the hoist rebounded with a bump which sent Nicolo twenty feet into the air. He came down again on the sand and his tongue was loosened so freely that he let out yells that were heard for blocks.

Another workman went running to pick him up and carried him to the sidewalk where an ambulance surgeon examined him. The ankle on which his weight rested as he stood in the hoist was shattered. There was no evidence of any other injuries.

While alone in the store, Miss Reuter stooped down to pick up a paper protruding from a counter near the rear entrance. As she did so she saw a masked man hiding there.

When Mr. Reuter reached his sister, she was unconscious on the floor bleeding profusely from wounds on the side of the head. The burglar had disappeared.

A physician was summoned, and was successful, after a time, in restoring Miss Reuter. She was put to bed, and the family instructed not to permit her to be disturbed, as her condition was precarious.

Miss Reuter said it was by the merest accident she found the burglar, who evidently had secreted himself in the rear of the store hoping to rob the premises in the night.

There is an alley running parallel with Myrdas street, upon which the rear entrance opens, and it was out this alley, it is presumed, the burglar escaped. Miss Reuter is unable to describe him, and the family refuse to permit the police to see her for the present.

Mr. Reuter asked that the police defer the investigation until Tuesday morning, and in consequence nothing was done Monday night. Miss Reuter is about forty years old. The family is well known here.

'DEAD' HUSBAND FACES WOMAN

Sensational Turn to Breach of Promise Suit—Charge of Perjury Against the Plaintiff.

New York, Dec. 10.—A \$20,000 breach of promise suit was brought to a sensational halt here today when the "dead" husband of Mrs. Helen Cauley, plaintiff against David A. Sherard, a wealthy truckman, was brought into court very much alive.

The woman had just testified that her husband had died in December, 1903, in a railroad accident near Pittsburgh, as a result a charge of perjury was lodged against her.

The husband, Andrew J. Cauley, who seemed to be puzzled as to why he had been brought to the court room, testified that he married the plaintiff ten years ago and had breakfasted with her at their apartments only this morning.

"When did you first hear of this case?" asked Mrs. Cauley's lawyer. "I haven't heard of any case. I got some blue tickets to come down here and showed them to my wife, but she didn't know what they were for. She left the house this morning and said she had an engagement."

Mrs. Cauley, who is a trained nurse, alleged in her suit that Sherard had won her heart while she nursed him in a hospital and had promised to marry her.
