To the Honorable Police Jury of St.
Tammany Parish, Louisiana.

We, the undersigned white citi-
zens and tax payers, of the Ninth
Ward of this Parish and State hereby
appear through counsel and object to
Jacob Levy being given permission
to operate a colored barroom west
of Slidell as sought in his petition
now on file, for the following reason,
to-wit:

First—Because this same applica-
tion has been before this body, as
well as the preceding one, and after
two or three careful hearings on the
merits of the case, as well as a per-
sonal inspection by an authorized
committee, was rejected.

Second—Because it will materially
decrease the value of our own prop-
erty.

Third—Because he already owns
one negro saloon, within the cor-
porate limits of Slidell, which has
given officials considerable trouble,
and annoyance, and a negro saloon,
such as petitioner would operate in
the proposed location would not be
subject to police control, and still be
near enough to said town to be the
source of constant trouble and an-
noyance, and a menace to the law
abiding citizens of said town and
vicinity.

Fourth—Because the sentiment of
a majority of the white citizens and
property holders of that vicinity, as
well as of the town of Slidell, are
against the granting of said license.

Fifth—Because petitioner has not
and cannot sufficiently comply with
the law to authorize the granting of
a permit to him to operate a negro
barroom at this place.

Wherefore, we ask your honors to
consider the objections contained in
our petition, and after due proceed-
ings had, to decline the granting of
permission to Jacob Levy to open
and operate said negro barroom.
