FRIEDMANN CURE IS GIVEN TO THE PUBLIC

Remedy for Tuberculous Treatment Derived from Cold-Blooded Animals.

Long Cultivation of the Germes Removes Danger of the Bacillus Becoming Virulent.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Translations of Dr. Frederick Friedmann's statements regarding his new system of treating tuberculosis have been completed, and data procured at the request of Congress soon will be printed.

Dr. Friedmann's address did not give the secret of his new remedy, which is understood to be a serum derived from cold-blooded animals. According to the official reports, he will not make this known until he is prepared to furnish it to physicians.

In his description of his search for a tuberculous cure and the method of applying the remedy, which he claimed had been tried by more than 1,123 persons, Dr. Friedmann said he discovered an "invariable race of tuberculous." They were not then fit to use in man, but he succeeded, after long experiment, in completely changing their character.

Dangers of the bacillus becoming virulent after being injected into the human body was removed, Dr. Friedmann said, by long cultivation of the germes.

"Finally, I repeatedly injected it into myself," he continued, "then into adult tuberculous patients, then into consumptive children and, finally, when the successful therapeutic results continued to be confirmed (which was a long time afterward) into children by way of prophylactic inoculation."

Dr. Friedmann did not enter into a description of his preparation which is to be published by Congress.

"The preparation proved absolutely harmless, even in large doses, and, however, applied," he said. "The treatment consists in intramuscular incorporation occurring once, twice or three times, seldom often, and repeated at intervals. An infiltrate usually forms at the place of injection, this infiltrate should be from the size of a walnut to that of a small apple, and will gradually disappear in the course of the next few weeks or months. As long as this issue exists and during its gradual absorption the healing will go on.

Only if and as long as the injected substance is completely absorbed and remains in the body do the healing effects appear most striking. As a rule, this occurs very soon and the healing then progresses steadily. We often find at the place of injection a single injection, bone and joint stiffness of long years standing become clean and close, while scleroderma are covered over with young and healthy skin; big, hard glandular tumors diminish considerably in size; tubercular abscesses drain down and clear; chronic scrofulous scars heal permanently, and last, but not least, pulmonary consumptives lose all their troubles and physical symptoms of disease.

Dr. Friedmann admitted that with some patients the "resorption" of the substance is not complete, and that it became useless to give a new injection. In many cases, he said, he had had failures.

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, La., in legal session convened, That a per capita tax of one (\$1.00) dollar be and the same is hereby levied for the year 1913, upon all male persons between the ages of eighteen and fifty-five years within the parish of St. Tammany.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance does not apply to persons living within the corporate limits of any city, town or village in said parish.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person failing, neglecting to pay said tax on or before the 1st day of March, 1913, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten (\$10) dollars, and, in default of the payment of said fine, imprisonment in the parish jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That all laws or parts of laws contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed.

LICENSE ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, La., That a license be and is hereby levied for the year, 1913 upon each person, corporation, firm or association pursuing any occupation, business or calling carried on, conducted in the parish subject to the payment of the amount of license due this parish for each year's occupation, business or calling carried on, conducted in the parish subject to a license is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied by the State for such trade, occupation, business or calling in this parish, except the liquor license, which shall be Five Hundred Dollars.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the amount of license due this parish for each year's occupation, business or calling carried on, conducted in the parish subject to a license is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied and collected by the State for such trade, occupation, business or calling in this parish, except the liquor license, which shall be Five Hundred Dollars.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person failing, neglecting to pay said tax on or before the 1st day of March, 1913, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten (\$10) dollars, and, in default of the payment of said fine, imprisonment in the parish jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That all laws or parts of laws contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed.

FETITION.

The following petition was received from the patrons and taxpayers of school district No. 9.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana.

The petition of the undersigned property taxpayers of School District No. 9 of the Parish of St. Tammany, as created and defined by a resolution of the Board of School Directors of said parish, passed on the 20th day of December, 1912, and being and constituting one-fourth of the property taxpayers eligible to vote at such election, respectfully pray that your honorable body, acting within and under the authority of the Constitution and laws of Louisiana, do order that a special election be held, in the manner required by law, for the purpose of determining whether or not (1) a special tax shall be levied and collected in said district, and (2) debt incurred and bonds issued by the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Petitioners pray that at said election your honorable body do submit to a vote of the property taxpayers of said school district No. 9, entitled to vote at said election, the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of 3 1/2 mills on the dollar on all property in school district No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of 10 years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to public schools.

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And, whereas, in the opinion of this board such special election is necessary and advisable.

Be it resolved by the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, as follows:

Section 1. That a special election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in school district No. 9 of the parish of St. Tammany, on

Section 3. That the polling places for said election shall be at the Town Hall in the town of Shidell, and J. W. Decker, John Peterson and F. A. Bourgeois are appointed commissioners and W. H. Gardner, clerk of election to serve at the polling place at the Town Hall in Shidell, La. At said election the polls shall be conducted under the laws of the State applicable thereto.

The President of this board is hereby instructed to give notice of the special election herein ordered to be held in accordance with the laws of Louisiana, and to be published according to law, and said proclamation he shall announce that at ten o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, March 6, 1913, this board will
