CLERK EXAMINATION, POST-OFFICE SERVICE.

Place of Examination, Covington, La. Date of Examination, April 12, 1913.

The United States Civil Service announces that on the date and at the place named above an examination will be held for the position of clerk in the postoffice at that place. Applicant must have reached their eighteenth birthday on the date of the examination. The age limits are waived however, in the case of persons honorably discharged from the United States military or naval service by reason of disability resulting from wounds or sickness incurred in the line of duty.

Male applicants for the postoffice service must be at least 5 feet 4 inches in height in bare feet, and 125 pounds in weight without overcoat and hat; otherwise their applications will be cancelled. Female applicants are not required to be of any specific height or weight.

Applicants for the postoffice service are required to be physically sound and in good health. The postoffice department has advised the commission that no person who is defective in any of the following named particulars will be appointed to the position of clerk in the postoffice service: Hunchbacks; persons having defective hearing, sight, or speech; persons blind in one eye; one-armed, one-handed, or one-legged persons; or those having crippled arms or legs, or those suffering from asthma or hernia, except that deaf-mutes and persons with defective speech or hearing may be appointed to the positions of mail clerk, distributor, and directory and forwarding clerk. Applications from persons not entitled to examination on account of physical defects will be canceled. Other physical defects may disbar persons from this examination when in the judgment of the commission such defects would render them unfit to perform the duties of the position for which the examination is held.

Married women will not be admitted to this examination. The prohibition, however, does not apply to divorced women or women who are separated from their husbands and support themselves. This examination is open to all citizens of the United States who comply with the requirements. From the eligibles resulting from this examination it is expected that certification will be made to existing and future vacancies.

FLOOD WARNING ISSUED BY THE WEATHER BUREAU.

Washington, March 27.—A flood of the first magnitude in the Ohio Valley, to be followed by a prolonged period of high water in the Mississippi river below Cairo, was predicted to-night by the Weather Bureau. Fair weather is prevailing over practically the entire country, but the clearing up rains Wednesday night were unusually heavy and the Weather Bureau forecast, that the Ohio flood will closely approach that of January, 1907.

Flood warnings have been issued for the James river of Virginia, the Pedee of South Carolina, the Tennessee and Cumberland at points in Tennessee, Kentucky and Alabama. The storm which has been causing serious floods in the Central States is now passing into the Atlantic Ocean.

FIRE AND LOOTING BRING CONDEMNATIONS IN DAYTON TO STATE OF PANIC.

West Dayton, March 27.—The First National building in Central Dayton is burning. The flood waters have receded so far that firemen with an engine succeeded in getting across and all persons who wish to leave are being brought out. The Third street bridge over the Big Miami river is safe, and it appears that by daylight the militia guarding the district will know the full extent of the disaster there. Many persons thought tonight refused to leave, believing they could better secure food and clothing there than in other parts of Dayton.

The police and militia report that looters are working in the central district. All persons not able to give a satisfactory explanation of their actions are arrested. Persistent but unconfirmed rumors, tell of looting being shot. Wildest rumors were in circulation and serious trouble is expected.

WHITE MAN DYING FROM NEGRO BLOW

Hammond, March 27.—Powers were searching the country about Hammond Friday for two negroes, names unknown, who Thursday night, assaulted Wendell Schulties, an employe on the Joe Demarco dairy farm here, robbed him of his savings and left him dying. Excitement ran high and the lynching of the two negroes, if captured, was expected. Schulties, unconscious, and lying in a pool of blood from an ugly wound in his head, was discovered Friday morning when Demarco entered the employe's room in the dairy barn. Near the injured man lay a bloody ax. Two negroes, recently employed at the dairy, who were missing, were supposed to have been the assailants. Schulties, who is thirty year old, came here recently from New Orleans, where he had been employe on the Wheeler dairy farm. He was shot and wounded by a...

WEAK LEVER SPOT WILL BE REPAIRED.

Baton Rouge, March 27.—Steps were taken today by Mayor Roux and Councilman Larquier to further protect the river banks, at Baton Rouge in event of a record-breaking flood.

There is only one weak spot in the Baton Rouge levee, and that is near the Moorman mill. This will be repaired at once and piling driven to protect the banks. When high water was threatened last month the upper banks of the river were repaired. The Ohio flood will closely approach that of January, 1907.

The river today at Baton Rouge stands 28.30 feet, a rise of 2 of a foot during the past twenty-four hours, recording the first rise caused by the hard rains in the Ohio Valley today one year ago the river at Baton Rouge stood 31.05 feet, a difference of 2.75 feet.

WILSON MAY GO TO STERKHEIM DISTRICT

Washington, March 27.—President Wilson has determined to go to the Ohio flood district if his presence there can do any good. It was announced at the White House today that the president would await the arrival of Secretary Garrison after he arrives in the flood district, and decide then if he will join the aid party.

Secretary Garrison, of the War Department, left Washington, today for the flood district to take personal charge of the relief measures being conducted by the army and to personally represent President Wilson.

Secretary McAdoo today placed all the United States life-saving stations in the vicinity of the flooded district at the disposal of Governor Cox, of Ohio, and Governor Ralston, of Indiana, ordering the crews to respond immediately and directly to requests of the state executives.

The lighthouse tender Golden Rod near Louisville, capable of navigating the swollen waters and with relief accommodations for 300 persons has been ordered into the flooded district by Secretary Redfield.

All lighthouse service employes of the Fourteenth District have been ordered to take available small boats and do relief work. Secretary McAdoo will admit free of duty relief supplies from Canada for the flood sufferers of Ohio and Indiana. He waived the tariff restrictions today upon the receipt of a telegram from Mayor B. N. Price of St. Thomas, Ontario, saving the people of that city wishing to send food, clothing and medicine.

CHANGE IN TIME.

New Orleans Great Northern Announces New Schedule.

A statement was issued Wednesday by the New Orleans Great Northern Railroad announcing the change of time of several of its trains, effective Sunday, next (to-morrow).

The excursion trains of Sunday and Wednesday which departed at 7:45 a. m., will leave at 7:35 a. m. from the Terminal Station, and the same excursion trains, returning will arrive at the Terminal Station at 5:05 p. m., instead of 5 p. m.

The Sunday excursion train from Columbia, Tylerstown and Bogalusa and other stations on the main line and Hogue Chitto branch, will reach New Orleans at 10:05 a. m., instead of 10:30 a. m.

An additional Sunday excursion train will also be operated from Folsom, Covington, Abita Springs, Mandeville and other points on the Shore Line, to connect with the northbound train referred to, and coaches will be run through on this train so as to avoid delay by reason of transferring. This new departure will enable the patrons on the Shore Line to come to New Orleans on Sunday and enjoy the baseball games as well as other forms of amusement.

While the company published reduced rates last year on the main line and Bogue Chitto branch, it will also publish effective next Sunday, a \$1.25 fare from stations north of Ramsey and from Ramsey and south to New Orleans \$1, which is the same fare as applies from New Orleans on Sundays. This additional train service and greatly reduced fares will no doubt meet with the approval of the St. Tammany patrons and add to the travel into New Orleans each Sunday.

There will be a slight change in the departure of the "St. Tammany Special," which will leave Covington at 6:25 a. m. instead of 6:23 a. m. next Monday.

The New Orleans Great Northern Railroad announced that it would extend Wednesday excursions north of Ramsey at the regular Sunday fare also that Wednesday excursions will be inaugurated for the season 1913 on April 16, and be continued until the fall season.

THIS SOON TO BE ASKED FOR THE NEW ROAD.

Proposed Line to Extend From Gulfport to Covington.

Gulfport, Miss., March 26.—There is a current rumor that construction of the Gulfport and Western between this city and Covington, La., will begin within the next 60 days. E. W. Long, chief engineer of the company in the city from New York, and it is understood that his visit is to secure data to complete estimates, required as to certain bridges along the line of the road.

The promoters of the road have been quietly completing details of the survey, and while every precaution has been used to keep the plans from the general public, it is known that in a short time bids will be asked for the first 10 miles of the road.

When built the road will open up the richest standing timber in the state of Mississippi, which will find its outlet through the port of Gulfport.

NEIGHBOR CRUSHES CARPENTER'S SKULL.

Hattiesburg, Miss., March 27.—J. G. Green lies mortally wounded at a local hospital as the result of a blow on the head this morning at the hands of his next door neighbor, E. F. Maxwell. The wounded man is a carpenter and the other a transfer man. For some time the males of Maxwell have been trespassing on the premises of Green by cutting shrubbery and severing over the fence around Green's place. Threats had been made by Green that he would shoot the males if they were not stopped at night. Early last night the threat was carried out, and one of the males received a load of shot. En route to town to-day Green was stopped by Maxwell and asked why he could not "live peacefully with his neighbors." The story told by those present is that Green advanced toward Maxwell with open knife and was struck with the handle of a shovel, the skull being crushed by the blow.

Maxwell made no effort to escape and is in the custody of the sheriff awaiting developments in Green's condition. Maxwell says he regrets having hit his neighbor so hard.
