INTERURBAN ROAD FOR ST. TAMMANY PARISH. Sidell Town Council Grants Franchise to the Interurban Railway Company...

It was announced Wednesday that a franchise has been granted by the town council of Sidell to the Interurban Railway Company...

When completed the proposed line will connect New Orleans with Covington, and the promoters expect it will be the means of building up St. Tammany parish as a suburban section to the city.

The principal purpose intended for the line, it is stated, is to make it convenient for persons residing in that section to transact business in New Orleans during the day and return home in the evenings.

The president of the company, J. Chicago, whose name is withheld, was said to be in the city Wednesday, and he will visit the section on an inspection trip Thursday.

The company is capitalized for \$150,000. This is to be sufficient for the immediate work contemplated. The capital stock, however, will be increased to meet the demands, and it is stated there is large capital behind the project.

Terminal arrangements in New Orleans are yet to be adjusted. It is stated, though, that practically all other arrangements for right of way have been arranged.



CONVENTION OF LOUISIANA BANKERS. Successful Session of Group "E" Held At Hammond March 26 and 27.

The first annual convention of Group "E" of the Louisiana Bankers' Association, was held at Hammond March 26 and 27, was most successful and interesting one.

The following subjects were considered in open discussion, each speaker being allowed five minutes. Possibilities and Benefits of Group System.

DECISION OF SUPREME COURT

Interesting Interpretation of the Primary Law in Case from Country.

Alfred F. Lacombe vs. George P. Laborde.

Section 27, of Act 49, of 1906 clearly provides that when one has entered a primary for nomination to an office and has been defeated, he shall not be eligible thereafter to be a candidate for that office at the general election.

The inhibition placed upon the candidate at the court in the primary, however, does not prevent the voter from voting for the candidate defeated in the primary.

To hold that the one receiving the majority of votes at the general election is not entitled to the office because he was not eligible as an official candidate would have the effect of disregarding the will of the people, as expressed by their votes, and this will not be done unless it is clearly shown that the law is illegal.

This illegality, however, must be clearly expressed in the law and is not to be eked out by doubtful inference, and as no part of the statute authorizes this court to declare void an office to which one has been elected by a majority of the voters, former election will not be disturbed.

Former decree reversed and judgment of District Court affirmed.

New Orleans, April 1.—April Fool pranks were plentiful about the City Hall Tuesday.

One of the first to be the victims of "jokers" was Mayor Behrman, who received from Staub, the book dealer, a copy of "John of Johnston."

George Smedley, clerk in the office of the City Attorney, pretended that he was celebrating the event of his four years tenure in office, and had a bucket of lemonade and a supply of cake in one of the rear rooms of the office.

The cake was real but the lemonade was made with red ink, and those who were about to drink the fluid were stopped and "given the laugh."

Several of the employees about the City Hall were "caught." Mike Rooney tried to fool Commissioner Lafare with a "phony" sample of Dollarway pavement done up in a pretended mail package, but the commissioner remembered the day and recognized the samples as not being good pavement even before he removed the wrapper.

Every City Architect Christy also was remembered and upon reaching his office found a body of young women who were applicants for a position in his office as stenographer, and had been duped by a "joke" advertisement.

Mr. Christy also was the victim of misfortune later in the day through blowing out two tires of his automobile. This he declared was no joke.

The proprietor of the Marble Hall opposite the City Hall, an establishment frequently patronized by the City Hall employees also was the victim of a fake advertisement, and turned away dozens of applicants for a position as barkeeper.

JOE MANDOT SAVES LIFE OF A FRIEND.

Plunged Into the Lake at Alton and Pulls Him From Watery Grave.

New Orleans, April 1.—Taking in a difficult situation at a glance, Joe Mandot, New Orleans favorite boxer, plunged into a lake at his training farm at Alton and saved the life of his friend, Leon Baudet, of this city, Tuesday shortly before noon.

According to a report related by friends of the little fighter, Joe was coming from his morning road work when he saw a capsized boat in the middle of the lake. Clinging to it with the desperation of a drowning man were Baudet and Kid Herman.

Another fighter who had taken a Clad in fannels and high top leather boots, Joe plunged in, swimming about a hundred yards before he reached his friends, just as he reeled and slipped unresistingly under the surface. With a quick dive, Joe gripped his clothing and swam back to the bank, dragging the semiconscious man to his wake.

ALLEGED SWINDLER LANDS IN PRISON.

Andrea Filpi Is Charged by Nicolo Matarano, a Jefferson Truck Farmer, With Obtaining a Car of Vegetables Under False Pretenses.

New Orleans, April 1.—Roused out of bed at five o'clock in the morning by officers from Jefferson parish armed with a warrant for his arrest on a charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses, Andrea Filpi was taken from the St. Charles Hotel to the parish prison Tuesday, where he remained until the court ordered his transfer to Gretna to answer the charge.

Deputies Counselman and Tower, with the assistance of local officers, made the arrest. Filpi is accused by Nicolo Matarano, a truck farmer of Westwego, with having procured from him a cartload of mixed vegetables valued at \$340 on the pretense of having them shipped to a commission house at Chicago, for which he claimed to be a representative.


Filpi left about the same time as the vegetables and Matarano charged that Filpi received them upon their arrival at the Windy City and disposed of them for his own account, pocketing the proceeds. It has developed that the supposed commission house is a myth. Justice of the Peace Dauenbaur, committed Filpi to prison without bond, and the prisoner is now awaiting the action of the District Court. He will make no statement.

WRECK AT LITTLE WOODS.

Rear End Collision Results in Two Being Injured.

New Orleans, March 31.—During a heavy fog early Monday morning, a Northeastern freight train crashed into the caboose of a standing south-bound extra freight of the New Orleans Great Northern, near Little Woods, about seven miles north of the Terminal Junction.

The caboose was crushed to splinters and two employees of the Great Northern sleeping in the caboose were seriously, but not fatally injured. They were Fred Fowell, aged 33 years, of 3010 St. Claude, J. Bailey, aged 42 years, conductor of the train resting at McDonoughville, who suffered a fracture of one leg. Both were conveyed to the Charity Hospital being brought from the scene of the wreck to Freret street station on a hand car.

From the official report of the Northeastern operating department issued by President D. D. Curran, it is declared that the flagmen or brakeman of the Great Northern freight did not protect the rear of his train by observing the flagging rules, but went forward to attend to the hot box which had caused the train to stop.

The collision occurred immediately inside of the automatic block signal "186-7" and the official report holds that the Northeastern engineer did not obey the caution signals shown by the device. The semaphore was found at danger, by the investigating official.

Engineer Jackson of the Northeastern freight train claims that he mistook the signal. Both he and his fireman, Wallace Anderson, jumped and escaped injury. Jackson says that he applied the emergency when the end lights of the caboose came into view, but it was too late.

The caboose of the freight was the only part of the train much damaged. The injured men were pulled out of the wreckage by Engineer Jackson after he stopped the locomotive.

The north and south main lines were obstructed for several hours on the Northeastern, but this was cleared up by noon, so that all traffic resumed on time aside from the regular morning trains.

President Curran's report says: "When the New Orleans Great Northern freight train stopped, it was the duty of the conductor to immediately send the flagman or brakeman to protect the rear of his train, but instead of doing this the brakeman went forward to attend a hot box on account of which his train had stopped. When the New Orleans Great Northern freight train stopped within block '186-7' a caution signal was displayed on the following train two miles north of the point at which the train stopped. It was the duty of the following New Orleans and Northeastern engineer, when he reached the caution block signal, to reduce his speed and proceed slowly prepared to stop in the event block '186-7' was found at danger."

"Evidently this rule was not observed otherwise the following train would have been brought to a standstill when it reached signal '186-7'. The conductor of the first train violated the flagging rules. The engineer of the first train, he did not blow his whistle for a flagman to go back. The following train evidently did not reduce speed according to caution signal, because hence it appears that the crew of the first train violated the flagging rules and disregarded block signal operation, causing the collision."
