VASSAR GIRLS IN VICE PROBES

Direct Police to Resorts Where Young
Women Have Been Enticed—Clew
Starts With Joy Rides—Prominent
Men Accused.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 5.—On
information gathered by several Vas
sar girls, who investigated conditions
here, warrant, today were taken out
for three young men prominent in
Fishkill Landing, who have fled or
learning of the serious charges. The
charges approach white slavery in
seriousness, and in addition to the
trio whose arrest, are sought, it was
learned that a score, more of well
known young men have disappeared
from their haunts at the alarming
news.

In addition to the issuance of war
rants it was predicted that several
hotels in Poughkeepsie and Newburg
would be closed as the result of the
efforts by the college girls to clean
up the county. Twenty Vassar girls
directed by Miss D. S. Rice, an alum
ni and a Charities Aid Association
staff member, acted as probation of
ficers, investigators and detectives,
before starting the crusade which in
volved the charges against a young
garage owner and two other young
men.

District Attorney Conger and Chiefs
Mera and Farrot of the Fishkill and
Newburg police are acting on the in
formation furnished by the college
girls, based on the stories of three
young girls now in custody. These
ward girls told of "joy rides" in
Dutchess county and will reveal a
local hotel.

The Vassar girls had studied local
conditions first in the juvenile court
then the police court and the night
court. Learning that conditions in
Dutchess county were in need of er
forming, twenty of them went to Fish
kill Landing to trace the young girls
who disappeared from that place. By
tracing mail they were able to learn
the names of the young men under
suspicion and the hiding places of
the girls. One of them wrote from
Yonkers.

The girls when brought home, told
the usual stories. They had been
promised \$50 a week in New York
at a place in East 143d Street. When
they arrived a woman told them they
had not good enough clothes, and
they were sent to get better ones.

and Gets Needed Schooling.

Seattle, Wash., May 5.—Paul Pat
kotak, an eighteen-year-old Eskimo,
will sail for Point Barrow, the Arctic
extremity of Alaska, on May 22 on
the schooner "Transit" to claim the
hand of Miss Alice Ahlook, native
teacher in the Point Barrow govern
ment school, who refused to marry
him three years ago because of his
lack of education.

When he was rejected by Miss Ah
look the youth trapped enough Arctic
foxes to pay for a year's schooling
and worked his passage to Seattle.
Here he was permitted to enter our
grammar schools because of the
knowledge he had gained at the Point
Barrow school. His summer vaca
tions were spent with a fishing fleet.
During the last year he has learn
ed shorthand, typewriting and book
keeping in addition to his other
studies.
