JACK JOHNSON SENTENCED TO ONE YEAR IN PEN.

Chicago, June 4.—Jack Johnson, negro heavyweight champion, today was sentenced to one year and one day in the State penitentiary at Joliet, and fined \$1000, for violation of the Mann "white slave" act. Sentence was pronounced on Johnson after Federal Judge Carpenter had denied a motion for a new trial. Johnson obtained two weeks' time in which to prepare a writ of error, and the bond for \$30,000, which he has been at liberty since his conviction, was allowed to stand.

Covington, La., May 19, 1913. A bridge to be built across Wright's Creek, near Sun, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, length of bridge 240 feet, 4 feet high from top of mud sill to top of floor, all material to be heavy pine.
