At the very first sight of this picturesque spot, the heart turns towards it with an ardent desire to become secluded from the derisions of society and the cruel deceptions of the world. As one gazes at the magnificent edifice, between the graceful branches of the aromatic cedars, it is impossible to conceive the idea that there ever was an unhappy creature confined in this admirable retreat. Its very exterior is symbolic of the contentment and heavenly joy that reigns supreme in its interior. Nothing concerning worldly affairs agitates the prevailing tranquillity of the convent. Whatever may take place out of the gates of this Academy, no matter what the nature may be, does not penetrate its walls and supreme peacefulness remains undisturbed. Is it a wonder then that convents have always been designated "isles of peace in a sea of trouble." Surely, there can be no doubt for the statement, since this opinion is identical in every convent, for where virtue is practiced peace is enjoyed. When one enters the stately in-

stitution a thrill of intermingled awe and joy passes through the constitution as one beholds the serenity and satisfaction stamped on the countenance of each inmate. They each have a special occupation to execute and their respective duties are attended to with such voluntary complacency that for a moment the tumult of the turbulent world is completely forgotten and one becomes body and soul enthralled in admiration of this novelty; and we wonder if there ever could be experienced such unalloyed happiness in this miserable life. Under the influence of those whose lives are spent for God and for His little ones, whose prayers are daily wafted heavenward for those under their care, is a fitting place to spend youth and to be prepared for a life of vicissitudes. Oh! it is not so glorious now, as it appeared when we, weary of books and tired of school, our sighted for the ultimate termination.
