PATTON'S WIFE BAREFOOTED THINLY CLAD

CLAYBURN UNDERESSED AND LYING ON BED IN ROOM THE WIFE FLIES FROM.

SLIPPERS UNDER CLAYBURN'S BED

When Confronted by Husband Clayburn Reaches for Pistol Under Pillow. Is Shot.

Shreveport, La., July 15.—As a result of his sensational testimony at the preliminary hearing today J. T. Patton, who killed Tom Clayburn Friday night, was admitted to \$500 bail by Judge Land.

Patton told a dramatic story of long mistrust of his wife which had been repeatedly turned aside by Clayburn's assurances of friendship.

Returning home when he was least expected he found his terrified wife coming out of the door of Clayburn's room with a single, diaphanous garment on, he said.

Patton said that Clayburn reached under his pillow for an automatic revolver when he saw he was caught but he was too quick.

Clayburn boarded with Patton at the latter's home in Vivian. The two were oil men and were close friends Patton Hates Shame

Of His Family Life.

At the hearing today Patton, knowing that his life depended on it, told the whole story without sparing his wife or the dead man. His testimony was given in a firm tone. He said Clayburn had failed to keep an appointment with him to go to Oil City, and he became suspicious.

"I got home about 8 o'clock Friday night," said Patton. "I didn't make any more noise than was necessary, but I walked in the front door. As I did so my wife ran out of Clayburn's room. Her hair was down. She was barefooted, and had only a thin slip on."

Says Mrs. Patton Tried To Save Clayburn.

"She tried to shut the door of the room so that I could not get in. I got there first, and opened it."

"Clayburn was lying full length on the bed without any clothes on. As I came in he jumped to a sitting position, and without a word darted his hand under the pillow for the gun I knew was there."

"I was ahead of him. I fired two shots. Clayburn fell back dead."

C. E. Dunson, a justice of the peace testified that a neighbor came running to his home and told him of the killing. He hurried at once to the Patton home. He said he found Mrs. Patton in a kimono.

He declared that Mrs. Patton was barefooted, and that he later found her two slippers under the edge of the bed on which Clayburn was killed.

Automatic Pistol On Clayburn's Bed.

"On the bed," said Mr. Dunson "lay an automatic pistol. Several slippers were scattered around it."

Mrs. Patton denounced the killing as unjust.

Patton declared that there was about three more persons about town that he would like to treat as he did Clayburn. He declared they had all been trying to break up his home.

J. H. Porterfield testified that he went to the Patton home Friday afternoon to deliver butter. He said that he saw Mrs. Patton sitting in Clayburn's lap with her feet "biked upon the window sill."

Patton's friends left for Vivian immediately after the hearing to get the prisoner's bond signed there. Patton expects to gain his liberty tomorrow.

There will be an examination of teachers held in Covington, for white teachers August 4, 5, and 6; for colored teachers, August 7, 8 and 9. Supt. Lyon states that the rules of the State Board of Education will be strictly enforced, and only those teachers will be allowed to teach who have valid credentials.

PETITION.

The following petition was received from taxpayers of school district No. 8:

To the Honorable President and Members of the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana:

The petition of the undersigned property taxpayers of School District No. 8 of the parish of St. Tammany as created and defined by a resolution of the Board of School Directors of said parish, passed on the 26th day of December, 1912, and being and constituting one fourth of the property taxpayers eligible to vote at such election, respectfully pray that you, honorable body, acting within and under the authority of the Constitution and Laws of Louisiana, do order

that a special election be held, in the manner required by law, for the purpose of determining whether or not (1) a special tax shall be levied and collected in said district, and (2) debt incurred and bonds issued therefor as hereinafter set forth.

Petitioners pray that at said election your honorable body do submit to a vote of the property taxpayers of said School District No. 8, entitled to vote at said election, the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 8, of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually for a period of ten years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to public schools.

In answer to the above petition the following resolution was offered by Mr. Hansbrough, who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Mr. Parker:

Whereas there has been filed with this board a petition signed by one fourth of the property taxpayers of School District No. 8, eligible to vote at such election, praying that a special election be ordered in and for said district No. 8, at which shall be submitted the following proposition, to-wit:

Proposition.

To levy a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 8, of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of ten years, for the purpose of: Giving additional aid to public schools.

And, whereas in the opinion of this board such special election is necessary and advisable.

Be it resolved, by the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, as follows:

Section 1. That a special election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in School District No. 8 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on Saturday, the 16th day of August, 1913, at which shall be submitted the following proposition, to-wit:

Proposition:

To levy a special tax of three mills on the dollar on all property in school District No. 8, of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of ten years for the purpose of: Giving additional aid to public schools.

That the Secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election a sufficient number of ballots on each of which shall be printed the proposition mentioned in section one of this resolution and in the following form:

Proposition:	YES
Proposition to levy a three mill special tax on all the property subject to State taxation in School District No. 8, of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, for the period of ten years for the purpose of giving additional aid to public schools.	NO

Notice to Voters:—To vote in favor of the proposition submitted on this ballot place a cross (X) mark in the square after the word "Yes," and to vote against it place a similar mark in the square after the word "No."

And that the secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at the said special election all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, list of voters, assessed valuation of property, and compiled statement of voters in number and amount.

Section 3. That the polling place for said election shall be the regular polling booth of the eighth ward of St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, and William Crockett, Jack Willis and Ed Foy are appointed commissioners and John Hager, clerk of election. And said election shall be conducted under the laws of the State applicable thereto.

Section 4. The president of this

board is hereby instructed to give notice of the special election herein ordered by his proclamation to be published according to law; and in said proclamation he shall announce that at 10 a. m., Wednesday, August 20, 1913, this board will meet at the office of the Parish Superintendent in Covington, La., and in open session proceed to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election.

On roll call the following members voted in the affirmative: George R. Dutch, H. T. Fauntleroy, P. H. Hansbrough, W. H. Kahl, H. Q. Parker, Dr. C. F. Farmer, T. P. Crawford, C. M. Liddle.

In the negative: None.

And the resolution was adopted.
