

ORDINANCE NO. 134.
An ordinance providing for the collection of delinquent taxes on real estate within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell, La., for the year 1913.
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., that the tax collector proceed immediately with the collection of all delinquent taxes levied upon real estate within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell, La., for the year 1913.
Section 2. Be it further ordained that the tax collector shall register a written notice to each and every delinquent taxpayer, notifying him to come forward and pay said delinquent taxes within twenty (20) days from the date of the said registered notice.
Section 3. Be it further ordained that if such delinquent taxpayer fail to pay said taxes, the tax collector shall advertise all delinquent property, as required by law, giving a list of all the property to be sold for taxes, the amount due by each and date on which said sale of property shall take place.
Section 4. Be it further ordained that the tax collector is hereby au-

thorized to collect twenty-five (25) cents from each delinquent taxpayer as the costs for each registered notice and said tax collector shall keep all receipts and cards for registered notices sent by him.
Section 5. Be it further ordained that after the expiration of twenty days after mailing of said notices the tax collector shall proceed to advertise and sell, to the lowest bidder, said delinquent property, as advertised, in conformity with the laws of Louisiana, in such cases made and provided.
Section 6. Be it further ordained that this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon and after its passage.

PROCLAMATION.
Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of St. Tammany, Lou-

isiana, at its regular meeting held on the fifth (5) day of July, 1913, I, N. H. FitzSimons, president of said board, hereby give notice that in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in School District No. 8, of said parish of St. Tammany Louisiana, on Saturday, the 16th day of August, 1913, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana, to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:
To levy a special tax of three mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 8, of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of ten years, for the purpose of: Giving additional aid to public schools.
For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be the regular polling booth of the eighth ward of the parish of St. Tammany Louisiana, and William Crookes, Jack Willis and Ed. Fox have been appointed commissioners, and John Hager has been appointed clerk of election.
At said special election the polls shall be open at seven o'clock a. m. and close at five o'clock p. m., and

in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.
