The Fairhope Becoming a Popular Pleasure as Well as Passenger Boat.

The popularity of the Fairhope as passenger and excursion boat across the lake shows what a cheap rate and quick time will do towards making the people up to the pleasure of such trip. Mr. Lancaster has done much to advertise Mandeville and he has put on excursions from Mandeville to New Orleans on Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesdays for 35 cents the round trip, which will take from four to five hours. The boat leaves Mandeville on arrival of the 4:00 o'clock motor car from Covington at 4:50 p. m. This makes a delightful ride across the lake and back, and the crowds that are taking advantage of this opportunity bespeak appreciation of the fairness of Mr. Lancaster in providing the means.

The boat also leaves Mandeville at 6:15 in the morning on Saturdays, Sundays, Mondays and Wednesdays, 35 cents the round trip.

SHOW AT MADISONVILLE TODAY AND TOMORROW.

The Low Rose Comedy Company will give a show and dance at Madisonville, on the 23d and 24th of August. The Dinkle Hippodrome Orchestra, of New Orleans, will furnish the music. This is the company that so kindly donated their services at the church entertainment at Mandeville and delighted every one with the excellent music. The reputation of this company should guarantee a first class performance, and no doubt Madisonville people will patronize them liberally.

Representative F. J. Helitz will introduce in the Legislature a bill for the founding and erection of a home for destitute children, to be situated in St. Tammany parish. It is proposed that \$20 shall be set aside from the funds of each parish in the State for each representative in the parish, for the purpose of maintaining the home, after the State shall have appropriated a sum sufficient for its construction, and \$6000 for maintenance. This will give an up-keep fund of \$50,000 per annum.

This bill will meet the approval of some of the foremost public men in the State and is endorsed by Mr. Wilson of the Juvenile Court in New Orleans. Furthermore, its situation in Covington would place it in the healthiest section of the State, within easy reach by the railroads and with general surroundings very favorable to such an institution.
