FOURTH CLASS POSTMASTER EXAMINATION.

To be Held at Covington, La., on Saturday, August 23, 1913.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces, that on the date named above an examination will be held at Covington, La., as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$410 for the last fiscal year.

Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 15 years women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted. Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Houltonville and the local secretary at Covington or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington at least 7 days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.
