AMERICAN GUNNERS WIN PALMA MATCH

United States Team Make Score of 1714--Argentine Score and With 1684.

Camp Perry, O., Sept. 8.--The United States team won the Palma match today with the score of 1714. The team from the Argentine Republic was second, with a score of 1684, nine points ahead of Canada's record of 1675. Sweden made 1484, and Peru 1465.

The shooting was on the 800, 900 and 1000 yard ranges. The scores are considered good as a strong cross wind blew in the faces of the shooters. The winning score was six points below that made by the United States team last year, when it captured the prize in Canada.

The Canadian team was much surprised at the result, as it came here determined to win back the prize. The Argentine shooters did well, considering that they were not accustomed to long range shooting.

RICE PRODUCERS QUIT THE MARKET

Allago Millers Are in Agreement to Keep the Prices Down.

New Orleans, Sept. 8.--Rice Producers are loud in their denunciation of the millers, and declare that there seems to be a fixed combination by the latter to keep the price of the cereal down. For a week the highest price offered by any buyer on the Board of Trade has been \$3.30 per sack, and the producers complain bitterly that far below the market value of rice at present.

Monday morning the representatives of the producers offered rice at \$3.75 per sack, and declared that under the conditions it was cheap at that price, but no buyers would take the offering. In interviews with several of the representatives of the producers on the floor of the exchange it was learned that the sellers of rice believe the price for fancy grades of rice should be much higher than at present. It is contended that the receipts are light, and conditions are such that the crop will be curtailed below early estimates. River rice is not coming in as fast as expected, say the sellers, and to back their declaration they cite that only 5000 sacks were brought into the market on six boats Saturday and Sunday. When the sellers found that the buyers would not raise price above \$3.30, which was fixed about ten days ago, they banded together and agreed to withdraw from the market. The consequence was that there was little or nothing doing on the floor Monday.

STENOGRAPHER READ NOTES. Recorded Conversation With Accused Lawyer on Detectphone, Alleged.

Guilford, Miss., Sept. 8.--The entire day of the Circuit Court was taken up today by the reading of stenographic notes of Joseph Beaman, a dictaphone operator, who made a record of all the conversations, it is alleged, that W. E. Barber, lawyer, accused of malpractice, had with the Burns' detectives in the fake damage suit against the traction company. Barber's lawyers strenuously objected to the reading of the notes and wanted them excluded from the records, but they were overruled by Judge Barrett. The notes largely supported the previous testimony of Detectives Harrell and Howard or Hutchinson. Beaman, the stenographer, will be cross-examined by Barber's array of lawyers.

WORK BEGUN ON NEW DEPOT. Report Declares It Will Be Old One Enlarged.

Pontchatoula, Sept. 8.--Ground was broken here this morning for the new Illinois Central freight and passenger depot. A force is at work tearing up the depot platform preparatory to removing the present structure 100 feet north. As it stands directly on the main thoroughfare, shielding the approach of fast trains from teamsters and pedestrians, it has been considered dangerous to traffic.

The Pontchatoula Progressive Union has been endeavoring to get a new depot for several years, the present one being inadequate, antiquated and entirely lacking the necessary sanitary appliances as required by law. Several months ago Secretary Wm. Alford of the Progressive Union received assurances from Superintendent Hill of the Illinois Central that blue prints for a new depot had been completed and were in the Chicago office awaiting such time as would be opportune to commence the building.

It is rumored that instead of a new one, as was anticipated, the old depot, after being removed, will be enlarged and repaired. There is objection to this on the part of the citizens who think that this town deserves better treatment at the hands of the railroad company on account of the large business the town gives it. The Progressive Union will take immediate steps to secure a fireproof structure and it is thought that, with the assistance of the town council, the "fire limit" ordinance will be brought into play and enforced against the company.

SENTENCES FOR DIGGS AND CAMINETTI MAY BE POSTPONED FURTHER.

San Francisco, Sept. 9.--Maury I. Diggs and F. Drew Caminetti, convicted under the Mann white slave act, will not be sentenced to-morrow when they appear before Judge Wm. C. Van Fleet, if the request of Special Assistant United States Attorney-general Theodore Roch is granted. Roch announced to-day he would ask for continuance until Monday on the ground that the Harris-Diggs case of subornation of perjury comes up this week and that he wishes to have all the cases completed before any sentence is pronounced.

The government prosecutor will not ask that a charge be pressed against Juror Helster for contumacious behavior at the trial, that he did not consider Caminetti guilty and merely voted so to save attorney's fees for the defendant's parents. The prosecutor says public contempt will be Helster's punishment and that a jury cannot impeach its own verdict.

DEMOCRATS PASSTARIFFBILL

La Follette and Poindexter Vote With the Democrats.

Washington, Sept. 9.--The Democratic tariff revision bill passed the Senate at 5:43 o'clock this afternoon, 44 to 37, amid a burst of applause that swept down from crowded galleries and found its echo on the crowded floor of the Senate. Its passage was attended with surprises in the final moments of the voting, when Senator La Follette, Republican, cast his vote with the Democrats and was joined a few moments later by Senator Poindexter, Progressive.

The Democrats had counted all throughout the long tariff fight upon losing the votes of Senators Ransdell and Thornton, of Louisiana. Democrats, who voted against the bill to-day because it would put sugar on the free list. Until the names of Senators La Follette and Poindexter were actually called, however, no one knew definitely the stand they would take, and their votes were greeted with enthusiastic applause.

Conferees Selected. The Senate endeavored to-day to hasten the bill on its progress to the White House by naming its members of the conference committee as soon as the bill passed. Vice President Marshall appointed Senators Simmons, Stone, Williams and Johnson, Democrats, and Senators Penrose, Lodge and La Follette, Republicans, as the Senate conferees. Senator Stone withdrew from the committee and Senator Shively was appointed in his place. The House conference was reported to-night, will be Representatives Underwood, Kitchen and Rainey, Democrats, and Payne and Fordney, Republicans. Each House will have an equal vote in the conference committee, even though each does not name the same number of conferees. How Votes Were Cast. TWENTY-THREE EARTHQUAKES IN ONE DAY CAUSES AMERICAN TO GIVE UP HIS JOB.

New Orleans, Sept. 9.--Twenty-three earthquakes within a period of twenty-four hours was too much for the nerves of Armistead Nelson Collier, the recently appointed secretary of the American legation at Guatemala City. As a consequence Mr. Collier gave up his post and returned with his wife to the United States on the steamship Coppename, which arrived here Monday. The earth tremors were large and small, and from the statement of fellow-passengers on the Coppename they tried the mettle of many of the foreigners. They occurred Saturday night and Sunday, August 30 and 31, and it was said that half the population of Guatemala City took to the open country in order to escape what they felt to be imminent destruction. Young Collier had arrived at Guatemala City the day before, fresh from Washington after having served in the American embassy at London in a secretarial capacity. He said that the salary offered for the post did not justify the nerve-racking experiences of the twenty-four hours in the Guatemala capital, so he hastened to return on the same steamer which had carried him from New Orleans to Port Barrios. He said he preferred to live in a country where earth-rendings were less frequent and where one could sleep in a bed without being violently ejected by the convulsions of nature. He left for Washington Monday night.

When the vote had been announced Senator Gallinger, of New Hampshire, the leader of the minority, was recognized and congratulated Senator Simmons for his courteous, kind and considerate manner in the conduct of the debate. He said he knew of no tariff fight characterized by such good feeling throughout and attributed it to the personality of Senator Simmons. Just before the voting on amendments began Senator La Follette yielded a few minutes of his time to Senator Thornton, of Louisiana, who was about to desert his colleagues on the roll call. "It is harder still that I should be compelled to do so on account of the fact that the Democratic party, to which my State of Louisiana has also given a steadfast allegiance during the last thirty-six years, in which her white people have controlled her affairs, seeks now through a provision of this bill to strike a mortal blow at one of her great agricultural interests. In violation of its settled tariff policy and of the pledges of its last national platform."

"Because I am an Ambassador here of the State of Louisiana, charged with the duty of defending her vital interests against injurious assault, and recognizing that I owe a higher degree of duty to my State than I owe to the Democratic party, and because, further, I recognize the binding obligation resting on me to redeem the solemn pledges I made to her people before and after my election concerning this very question, which my State of Louisiana has assembled in June, 1912, denounced this very provision of this bill as a heavy and cruel blow against Louisiana--for each and for all of these reasons I cannot vote for a bill which will needlessly destroy a great agricultural industry of my State and of many other States of this Union as well as deliver the people of this country into the power of the rapacious and infamous sugar trust, composed of the group of Eastern seaboard refiners."
