The M. C. B. THE CINDER TRACK.

Covington has been recognized as an ideal place for educational institutions. The climate is admirable, with plenty of pure water and an atmosphere that has attracted the attention even of physicians in Europe. Now comes Mr. Commagere, a successful instructor in athletics, who tells us that we have the soil for the fastest track in the country for pulling off athletic events. This means that the colleges of this section have an advantage that would bring students from every state in the Union, in preference to other sections. 
