ANNOUNCEMENT.

The 4th Annual St. Tammany Parish Fair will be held at Covington, Louisiana, October 22 to 25, inclusive, 1913. In presenting the Premium List, Rules and Regulations governing same, we desire to especially call the attention of the exhibitors to the extensive revisions that have been made in the various classifications and rules governing entrance in same.

CLOSING OF ENTRIES MONDAY, OCT. 20, UNLESS OTHERWISE AUTHORIZED.

In each and every department and class where premiums are offered, unless otherwise specified, entries will positively close Monday, October 20th, at 5 o'clock p. m., and no entries will be received for premiums after that date. Animals and articles are required to be on the grounds and properly placed by Wednesday, October 23rd, at 12 o'clock noon.

FEED.

Arrangements will be made with a responsible party to furnish straw hay, oats and chopped feed on the grounds at market prices, in quantities to suit the purchaser.

REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS.

Exhibitors must promptly claim and remove their property at the close of the Fair. No exhibits will be allowed to be removed from the buildings or grounds until 9 p. m., October 25.

DESIGNATION OF OFFICERS.

President—Gold badge with white ribbon. Vice President—Gold badge with red ribbon. Treasurer—Gold badge with pink ribbon. Secretary—Gold badge with purple ribbon. Directors—Gold badge with blue ribbon. Honorary Vice Presidents—Gold badge with red ribbon. Superintendents—Gold badge with orange ribbon, with department name thereon.

PRICE OF ADMISSION.

For each person, whether in carriage, on horse or foot, 10 cents. Children under 7 years, free. On Saturday, October 25, "School Day," no admission will be charged scholars who enter in parade. Interesting program under direct supervision of the Women's Progressive Union will start at 3 p. m. Friday, October 24—St. Tammany Day. All premiums will be awarded this day. Gates open at 1 o'clock p. m., and close at 10 o'clock p. m. Practical Farmer Harry Wilson and other agricultural authorities will deliver addresses at 3 p. m. Saturday, October 25—School and Trades Day. Gates open at 10 o'clock a. m., and close at 11 o'clock p. m. Scholars of colleges, private and public schools of the parish will assemble at 9:30 a. m. at the courthouse, there form in rank and parade to the grounds, reaching there at 10 o'clock a. m. R. B. Bruce, New Orleans, La., Judge. M. Watt Allen, Covington, La., Superintendents. RULES AND REGULATIONS. All entries and awards in this department shall be subject to General Rules and Regulations printed in this catalogue. The following entry fees will be charged: Single birds, 25 cents each;

pairs, 50 cents; pens, \$1.00. All specimens must be entered as single to compete for pair or pen premiums. Exceptions are made in Bantam and Pigeon classes. Entry fee must accompany application for space, or the entry will not be accepted. Money will be refunded in cases where space cannot be furnished nor returned.

The Association reserves the right to accept or reject all applications for space made after October 20, 5 p. m., or to reduce space requested so as to accommodate all exhibitors. Entries in this department close October 20th, 5 p. m., and all birds must be in place in show room not later than 12 o'clock noon, Wednesday, October 23, on which date and time all unoccupied space shall revert to the Association and payments for space shall be forfeited. All poultry must be leg-banded and when entered for competition must be entered in the name of the actual owner. Any exhibitor found guilty of any attempt to deceive by false entries or otherwise shall forfeit all premiums won, together with entry money. Judging will be by comparison and will begin Thursday, October 23, 1913.

RESOLUTION Whereas, Milton Sharp, et al., has petitioned the board and after considering the petition and the plat of survey made by Howard Burns, Parish Surveyor of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., annexed and hearing of the parties present, and its appearance that petitioners lands are enclosed and surrounded by the lands of others and have no right of way to the public road, for the purpose of going to and from their lands to the public road with their produce; Therefore be it resolved, in open session convened, that petitioners be permitted to construct a roadway not to exceed forty (40) feet in width, over and across the following described lands, situated in the parish of St. Tammany, La., to-wit: A certain portion of the southeast fractional quarter of section 36, (p. 4) north, range 11 east, St. Tammany parish, La., to-wit: Beginning at the southeast corner of said section 36, thence north 2 degrees 24 minutes east 28.48 chains, thence north 50 degrees west 13.50 chains to the line of headright No. 46, thence south 39 degrees west along said headright line east 7 chains, thence south 2 degrees 24 minutes west 15.72 chains to the south line of section 36, thence south 83 degrees east 50 minutes along said section line 14.75 chains to the point of beginning, containing 34.37 acres, belonging to Edward Sharp, said roadway to follow the present location of the old Kimble road. Be it further resolved, That the amount to be paid the owner, Edward Sharp, for the privilege of constructing such roadway is hereby assessed at fifteen (\$15.00) dollars the value of the land traversed. Be it further resolved, That upon the payment of said amount to the owner of the land to be traversed by petitioners herein, the president of the police jury is hereby authorized to grant permit, in writing, to the petitioners, who shall be at once authorized to construct such roadway. AN ORDINANCE Making it unlawful for any person to dance the "Turkey Trot," "One Step," "Tango," "Bunny Hug," and any other immoral or suggestive dance at any public place in the parish of St. Tammany, La. Section 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, La., that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to dance the "Turkey Trot," "One Step," "Tango," "Bunny Hug," or any immoral or suggestive dance in any public place in the parish of St. Tammany, La. Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person or persons found guilty of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in a sum not to exceed \$50.00, or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days in the parish jail, or both, at the discretion of the judge. CHARTER OF THE OAKES DAIRY & STOCK FARM COMPANY. United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany. Be it known that on this 4th day of the month of September A. D. 1913, before me, Thos. M. Burns, a Notary Public in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared Harry C. Werts, Carl A. Werts and Fred L. Werts, all residents of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, who severally declared that they, their associates and successors, do hereby form and organize themselves into a corporation, for a term of ninety-nine (99) years from this date, under the name of the Oakes Dairy & Stock Farm Company, the domicile whereof is fixed at Covington, parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, its

objects and purposes being to buy and sell real estate, to deal generally in all the natural resources of the State of Louisiana; to buy and sell all kinds of stock and poultry, to breed and raise same; to carry on a general farm and truck business; to conduct a dairy and sell the products from the same; to slaughter all kinds of stock and poultry and to sell the same; to deal in all kinds of feed stuff and operate a commissary or store, and generally to do all things necessarily connected with the within objects and purposes above enumerated, in this State and elsewhere. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, divided into and represented by Two Hundred and Fifty (250) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each, which shall be paid for in cash or its equivalent in property, either real or personal; this corporation shall begin business and be a going concern as soon as Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars of its capital shall have been paid and subscribed for. Citation shall be served on the president, or in his absence on the secretary-treasurer. The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors composed of three stockholders, to be elected by the stockholders annual by ballot, on the first Monday of January, 1914, or any subsequent day fixed by the Board, in case of an election taking place on said day. Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote. Said Board shall have the right to make all by-laws and change and alter the same at pleasure; to use a corporate seal, the same to alter or break at pleasure. The first Board of Directors shall be composed of Harry C. Werts, Carl A. Werts and Fred L. Werts, of whom Harry C. Werts shall be President; Fred L. Werts, Vice President, and Carl A. Werts, Secretary-Treasurer, and they shall hold their office until the first Monday in January, 1914, or until their successors are elected and take their place.
