Notice is hereby given that pursuant to an order and decree of Court granted in the matters of the above entitled succession, dated November 10, 1913, directing that certain property of said succession be sold at public auction for cash, to pay debts, after due advertisement, I, J. D. Cousin, Administrator of said succession, will proceed to sell certain property belonging to said succession for cash, to pay debts, at the late residence of the deceased, at Lacombe, on Saturday, the 20th day of December, 1913.

Said property consisting of the movable effects belonging to said estate not heretofore sold, all open accounts due said estate, and the following described real estate belonging to said succession, to-wit:

1st. An undivided one-half interest in certain pieces of land in St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, lying and situated in lot No. one (1) of section thirty-seven (37), township eight (8) south, range thirteen (13) east, Greensburg Land District, La., as surveyed and subdivided by P. N. RESOLUTION Whereas, Milton Sharp, et al., has petitioned the board and after considering the petition and the plat of survey made by Howard Burns, Parish Surveyor of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., annexed and bearing of the parties present, and its appearing that petitioners lands are so enclosed and surrounded by the lands of others and have no right of way to the public road, for the purpose of going to and from their lands to the public road with their produce; Therefore be it resolved, in open session convened, that petitioners be permitted to construct a roadway not to exceed forty (40) feet in width, and across the following described lands situated in the parish of St. Tammany, La., to-wit: A certain portion of the southeast fractional quarter of section 36, tp. 4 south, range 11 east, St. Tammany parish, La., to-wit: Beginning at the southeast corner of said section 36, thence north 2 degrees 34 minutes east 23.48 chains, thence north 50 degrees west 13.50 chains to the line of headright No. 46, thence south 39 degrees west along said headright line east 7 chains, thence south 2 degrees 34 minutes west 35.72 chains to the south line of section 36, thence south 89 degrees east 14.75 chains along said section line 58 minutes to the point of beginning, containing 34.37 acres, belonging to Edward Sharp, said roadway to follow the present location of the old Kimble road. Be it further resolved, that the amount to be paid the owner, Edward Sharp, for the privilege of constructing such roadway is hereby assessed at fifteen (\$15.00) dollars, the value of the land traversed. Be it further resolved, that upon the payment of said amount to the owner of the land to be traversed by petitioners herein, the president of the police jury is hereby authorized to grant permit, in writing, to the petitioners, who shall be at once authorized to construct such roadway.
