LICENSE ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany, La., that a license be and is hereby levied for the year 1914 upon each person, corporation, firm or association pursuing any occupation, business or calling carried on or conducted in this parish subject to a State license is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied by the State for such trade, occupation, business or calling in this parish, except the liquor license, which shall be five hundred (\$500) dollars.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the amount of license due this parish for each trade, occupation, business or calling carried on or conducted in the parish, subject to a license is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied and collected by the State for such trade, occupation, business or calling in the parish, except the liquor license, which shall be five hundred (\$500) dollars.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the license due this parish shall be and are hereby due and collectable at the same time and in the same manner as the license due the State, and in the event the same are not paid when due, it is ordered that the tax collector report the same to his attorney, who is hereby authorized and instructed to forthwith institute legal proceedings to enforce the payment of same.
