KILLS WIFE AND BABY GIRL.

Magician Declares He "Saw the Devil Walking in Their Eyes."

Cincinnati, Dec. 29.—"I saw the devil walking in their eyes." This was the reason Robert Maloney gave today for having killed his wife and baby daughter in a local hotel last night. His wife's maiden name was Othello Harriman, and they were married two years ago in Little Rock, Ark. Her father lives at Cushing, Okla. Maloney was a magician and he registered at the hotel under his stage name of J. R. Willard.

The double tragedy occurred in the Maloney's room. Mrs. Maloney and her baby, 1 year old, were shot as they slept. Immediately afterward Maloney, who was dressed in his undereclothing, ran screaming out of the room carrying a revolver. Men tried to stop him as he ran down the street, but he waived them aside with his revolver.

When he reached the suspension bridge W. T. Curry, the tender, attempted to intercept him. Willard struck Curry a powerful blow in the face and ran on. He finally was stopped and captured in the center of the bridge by Policeman James Holmes.

GRAIN MAN BORE; DEMANDS PRESIDENT "EXPLAIN" ON TARIFF.

Oklahoma Democrat Interrupts Flood of Congratulations With a "Hot" Message.

Pass Christian, Dec. 27.—Not all the telegrams received by the President Saturday were congratulations. A man up in Wynnewood, Okla., is sore and he doesn't care who knows it, in fact. When he heard that President Wilson was down South he galloped right over to the depot and sent Mr. Wilson a wire as follows: "Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States: 'I am a Democrat, born in Arkansas, raised in Texas, moved to Oklahoma through error. Why is it you took off fifteen cents per bushel duty on corn and left seven cents on oats? Wire answer at my expense.' (Signed) 'JOHN R. ROLLOW, 'Grain Dealer.'"

The president's stenographer did not think it a enough importance to get into conference with the President over this urgent wire from distant Oklahoma. So he did not wire the answer.

Before long there came another message from Mr. Rollow. He wanted to know why the President did not answer that corn and oat question, and again emphasized the point that he would pay for the reply himself. "I hope," the president's stenographer said as he read the second wire, "that Mr. Rollow is not waiting for an answer."

FATHER AND SON HELD FOR KILLING.

Testimony in Hog Stealing Case Led to Fatal Encounter.

Farmerville, La., Dec. 29.—Reports from Sade, La., a small town of the Farmville Southern Railroad, and about eighteen miles north of this place, in Union parish, announce the killing of O. L. Hodge and the fatal wounding of his son yesterday. W. T. Sehon and his son are charged with the killing.

The killing of the elder Hodge and the wounding of his son followed a quarrel which resulted from character evidence given before the District Court in the trial of the elder Mr. Hodge and his son in the December term, when the two Hodes were being tried for alleged hog stealing. The sheriff's office was notified of the shooting.

WOMEN WHO FIGHT INCOME TAX LIABLE.

Government Will Prosecute all Who Follow Dr. Anna Shaw's Advice.

Washington, Dec. 29.—Women who follow the advice of Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the National Woman's Suffrage Association, to offer "passive resistance" to the income tax law, lay themselves open to serious trouble with the government in the opinion of officials of the treasury department.

In an open letter addressed to "Caranchick Women of America," Dr. Shaw further advocated that they "decline to aid the government" in levying taxes upon them by refusing to further an open account of their property.

Treasury officials point out that it is just as much a violation of the law to refuse to make returns to the collector as to refuse to pay the tax after the assessment has been made. A fine of from \$20 to \$100 is the penalty provided and treasury officials declare that they propose to enforce the law.

ORDINANCE.

An ordinance to provide revenues for the town of Mandeville for the year 1913, for the purpose of paying the statutory, usual, necessary and ordinary charges of said town for the year 1914.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Mandeville, That seven (7) mills on the dollar is hereby levied on all taxable property taxable under the laws of the State of Louisiana, situated within the corporate limits of the town of Mandeville, according to the assessed value of the property as shown on the assessment roll of the town of Mandeville for the year 1913, which assessment is now on file in the office of the secretary of the town council, for the purpose of raising and providing sufficient revenues to meet statutory, usual, necessary and ordinary charges and obligations for the said town of Mandeville, for the year 1914, as shown by the budget of 1913, adopted by the said town council.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Tax Collector be and is hereby authorized and instructed to proceed with the collection of the taxes for the year 1913, according to the assessment roll for 1913, and the provisions and instructions herein.

AN ORDINANCE

Making it the duty of all physicians practicing in the town of Covington, La., to report to the Secretary of the Town Council all contagious and infectious diseases that come to their knowledge, wherein the parties so afflicted have moved out of the premises occupied by them by death or otherwise, and making it obligatory on all property holder or holders or their agent or agents to fumigate and disinfect their said house or houses wherein people afflicted with contagious or infectious diseases have resided moved out, either by death or otherwise, and fixing a penalty for the violation thereof.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, That it shall be and it is hereby made the duty of physician practicing within the limits of the town of Covington, to report to the Secretary of the Town Council all cases wherein people afflicted with contagious and infectious diseases have moved out of the premises occupied by them, either by death or otherwise, just as soon as the facts come to the knowledge of said physicians.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That each and every property holder or holders within the limits of the town of Covington, La., or their agent shall disinfect and fumigate all premises wherein people have been residing, afflicted with infectious or contagious diseases and have moved out of said premises, said fumigation and disinfection to take place immediately after their removal.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, That any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be tried before the Mayor and upon conviction shall pay a fine not exceeding Twenty Five (\$25) Dollars and shall be in default on or payment of the said costs shall be imprisoned in the town jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days.

ORDINANCE.

An ordinance levying annual tax upon all corporations, firms, persons, individuals, carrying on or pursuing any trade, occupation, business calling, within the limits of the town of Mandeville.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Mandeville, That a license tax is hereby levied for the year 1914 upon all corporations, firms, persons or individuals pursuing or carrying on any trade, occupation, business or calling within the corporate limits of the town of Mandeville, which is subject to State license.

Section 2. Be it further resolved, etc., That the amount of license tax shall be and the same is hereby fixed at the same amount that is now levied and collected by the State for the same kind of trade, occupation, business or calling, except the license for the sale at retail of spirituous or intoxicating liquors, of which the license tax shall be hereinafter fixed.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the license tax of carrying on business of saloon or the retailing of liquors in less quantities than five gallons is hereby fixed at the amount of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars. That license tax for carrying on business of selling or retailing beer or wine only, license tax is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That no license shall be issued for a longer period than one year, and the license tax as herein levied to be due and collectible on the same day and date as the license tax due the State. If not paid at the same time the same shall be delinquent at the same day and date as the license tax for the State becomes delinquent.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Tax Collector to notify all license tax payers when the said tax is due by them, and when the same shall become delinquent, and he shall report all delinquents to the Town Attorney who is hereby empowered to institute suit for the collection of said delinquent license. Tax payers shall be subject to all costs, charges and interest as is affixed by the law of this State.
