**UNIVERSITY HOPS BREACHED BY CADET'S BREACH.**

Faculty at State University May Not Allow Any Further Entertainments.

Baton Rouge, La., Jan. 12.—The immediate result of the alleged dancing of the one-step and other innovations and frills of the terpsichorean art at Louisiana State University Saturday night probably will be the discontinuance of all cadet hops. The withdrawal of a number of members of the German Club and the formation of another club with no connection with the university, it is said, will take place in the near future. The faculty committee on entertainment will meet to consider events and incidents at Saturday night's hop, said Lieut. Rozelle, the commandant of cadets.

Both the commandant and the president, Col. T. D. Boyd, manifested a disposition to close all sources of information as to just what did happen on Saturday night.

A careful investigation today developed a situation substantially as follows:

The faculty committee on entertainment met with the officers of the German Club at the beginning of the session and decided against the tango, fish walk, bunny hug, turkey trot, and other modern dances, including the buzzard flop and the grizzly bear. It was understood that Col. Boyd disapproved of everything except the old-fashioned waltz and two-step. No more dances were observed until it became necessary to admonish some visitors from New Orleans at the dance that followed the Tulane-Louisiana game. There was quite a stir Saturday night when attempts at the one-step were followed by the sudden appearance of Lieut. Rozelle, commandant of the cadets, in the dancing pavilion with paper and pencil, jotting down names of cadets indulging in the more daring dances. The list of offenders is said to have included two-thirds of the seventy-five present.

"Don't you," the commandant is reported to have informed a commissioned officer, tapping him on the shoulder.

"All right, lieutenant," the officer is said to have replied. Believing themselves caught and expecting punishment, the cadets concluded they would continue, since they would have to "face the music" anyhow, and continued their diversion, according to eye-witnesses.

Lovers of the dance at the university are wondering what will be allowed at future dances. Col. Boyd when asked by a correspondent whether he would give the one-step and kindred dances his sanction, replied that was none of the correspondent's or his paper's business.

He denied that he had ever issued an order forbidding such dances or had advised against them. "I would not know the one-step if I saw it danced," he confided.

The State Times, the local daily, has him credited with the following interview with one of its reporters to-day:

"President Boyd said that he would make an investigation of the reports circulated, and, if they were found to be true, this probably would mean the discontinuance of the hops."

"But if the cadet hops are discontinued it will not be because the cadets indulge in modern dances, but because a rule of the military department has been violated," said President Boyd.

"It would be the same with any other rule; it is simply a matter of discipline. The cadet hops are regulated by certain rules, and if the cadets fail to observe those rules, the privilege of attending such dances will be withdrawn."

Dr. C. E. Coates, Lieut. Rozelle and Prof. Broussard, the members of the faculty entertainment committee, all expressed themselves today as being in favor of the one-step, properly named. Lieut. Rozelle has created much favorable comment for his graceful one-stepping at several balls given here recently.

**ORDINANCE.**

An ordinance to provide revenues for the town of Mandeville for the year 1913, for the purpose of paying the statutory, usual, necessary and ordinary charges of said town for the year 1914.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Mandeville, That seven (7) mills on the dollar is hereby levied on all taxable property taxable under the laws of the State of Louisiana, situated within the corporate limits of the town of Mandeville, according to the assessed value of the property as shown on the assessment roll of the town of Mandeville for the year 1913, which assessment is now on file in the office of the secretary of the town council, for the purpose of raising and providing sufficient revenues to meet statutory, usual, necessary and ordinary charges and obligations for the said town of Mandeville, for the year 1914, as shown by the budget of 1913, adopted by the said town council.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Tax Collector be and is hereby authorized and instructed to proceed with the collection of the taxes for the year 1913, according to the assessment roll for 1913, and the provisions and instructions herein.

**AN ORDINANCE**

Making it the duty of all physicians practicing in the town of Covington, La., to report to the Secretary of the Town Council all contagious and infectious diseases that come to their knowledge, wherein the parties so afflicted have moved out of the premises occupied by them by death or otherwise, and making it obligatory on all property holder or holders or their agent or agents to fumigate and disinfect their said house or houses wherein people afflicted with contagious or infectious diseases have resided moved out, either by death or otherwise, and fixing a penalty for the violation thereof.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, That it shall be and it is hereby made the duty of physicians practicing within the limits of the town of Covington, to report to the Secretary of the Town Council all cases wherein people afflicted with contagious and infectious diseases have moved out of the premises occupied by them, either by death or otherwise, just as soon as the facts come to the knowledge of said physicians.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That each and every property holder or holders within the limits of the town of Covington, La., or their agent shall disinfect and fumigate all premises wherein people have been residing, afflicted with infectious or contagious diseases and have moved out of said premises, said fumigation and disinfection to take place immediately after their removal.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, That any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be tried before the Mayor and upon conviction shall pay a fine not exceeding Twenty Five (\$25) Dollars and costs, and in default of payment of fine and costs shall be imprisoned in the town jail for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days.

**ORDINANCE.**

An ordinance levying annual tax upon all corporations, firms, persons, individuals, carrying on or pursuing any trade, occupation, business calling, within the limits of the town of Mandeville.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Mandeville, That a license tax is hereby levied for the year 1914 upon all corporations, firms, persons or individuals pursuing or carrying on any trade, occupation, business or calling within the corporate limits of the town of Mandeville, which is subject to State license.

Section 2. Be it further resolved, etc., That the amount of license tax shall be and the same is hereby fixed at the same amount that is now levied and collected by the State for the same kind of trade, occupation, business or calling, except the license for the sale at retail of spirituous or intoxicating liquors, of which the license tax shall be hereinafter fixed.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the license tax of carrying on business of saloon or the retailing of liquors in less quantities than five gallons is hereby fixed at the amount of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars. That license tax for carrying on business of selling at retail beer or wine only, license tax is hereby fixed at the same amount and date as the license tax for the State becomes delinquent.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That no license shall be issued for a longer period than one year, and the license tax as herein levied to be due and collectable on the same day and date as the license tax due the State. If not paid at the same time the same shall be delinquent at the same day and date as the license tax for the State becomes delinquent.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Tax Collector to notify all license tax payers when the said tax is due by them, and when the same shall become delinquent, and he shall report all delinquents to the Town Attorney who is hereby empowered to institute suit for the collection of said delinquent license. Tax payers shall be subject to all costs, charges and interest as is affixed by the law of this State.
