

SOME GOOD ROADS.

Over four hundred and eighty thousand square yards of different types of roads for experimental and object lesson purposes were constructed during the fiscal year 1912-13 under the supervision of the office of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture, according to Bulletin No. 53 of the Department, making a total of over four million square yards of road constructed under the supervision of this office since 1905.

The type of roads built were brick, concrete, oil-cement concrete, bituminous concrete, bituminous-surfaced concrete, bituminous macadam,

surface treatment, macadam, asphalt, slag, oil-asphalt-gravel, oil-gravel, oil-corralline, gravel-macadam, gravel, slag, sand-clay, sand-gumbo, burnt-clay, shell and earth. The object lesson and experimental work during the past year was done at a cost to the local communities of \$139,841.89. This does not include the salaries and expenses of the Department engineers.

The road work during the year was done in Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, Nebraska, North Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Wisconsin and the District of Columbia.
