MANDEVILLE NOTES.

The St. Tammany Parish Medical Society met Tuesday, Feb. 10, at Dr. Paine's office. "The Business Aspect of the Profession" were discussed but owing to the limited attendance the subject was continued until the next meeting, Tuesday, March 10th, at 10 a. m., at Covington, when matters of vital interest to the members will be taken up. After the meeting the members of the society and their wives were entertained at a luncheon by Mrs. R. B. Paine.

Mandeville Fire Company No. 1 met last Monday night at the town hall. President W. C. Davis tendered his resignation as president, stating that he believed it was not right for him to act as president of the company and mayor at the same time, because of probable material interests between the two bodies, although unannouncedly urged to reconsider, he insisted and his resignation was accepted.

Of the many building sites offered, the location committee recommended the one on Jefferson between Laitte and Carroll streets next to the Catholic church, which recommendation was adopted. BATTLESHIP IN NEW ORLEANS FOR MARDI GRAS.

The United States battleship Ohio arrived in New Orleans Thursday afternoon direct from Vera Cruz, Mexico, and anchored just above Canal street landing. The arrival of the Ohio gives the navy two representative vessels in the port for the Mardi Gras festivities, with an even 2000 men aboard, including the regiment of marines aboard the transport Hancock. The revenue cutter Windom, with a crew of forty-seven, including officers, also arrived Thursday, and will remain throughout the Carnival.

Visitors will be received aboard the three vessels daily.
