Middle Roads School.

The Middle Roads consolidated school opened September 22, 1913, with J. A. Richardson as principal and Miss Beattie Fautleroy, one of the home girls, assistant.

The school has been a complete success throughout the entire term. In fact we doubt if any school in the parish can boast of greater harmony and more hearty cooperation among all concerned. We attribute our success not only to the conscientious efforts of the teachers, but to the respectful compliance of the pupils with school requirements and to the helpful cooperation of the parents and trustees.

This school is located in the center of a community of some of the most industrious and labor-loving people to be found in St. Tammany parish; a people who always stand ready to lend a helping hand to any cause that has for its object the upbuilding of their community.

Our pupils, numbering 72, show the same spirit of cooperation as is shown by their parents. They are not only ready to do well their part in

the advancement of their school, but enter their duties with zeal and determination. The appearance of the school grounds has been considerably improved by the principal and boys in removing unattractive logs and by the assistant and the girls planting a box flower garden.

We have given two entertainments during the season, one on the 19th of December, and another on the 20th of February. The pupils performed their parts well on both occasions. We doubt if they could be excelled by any in the parish with the same experience in that line. The pupils took the mid-term examinations, making a fair record.

The boys' and girls' club work has been properly looked after, the school low catching a live corn club and a vigorous tomato club, both of which we are proud. These clubs will not only help the boys and girls at this time, but will be of material benefit to them when they have become men and women.

The pupils are now endeavoring to take strong parts in the rally, where we are anticipating a pleasant and profitable intermingling with the other schools of the parish. And we are going to do our best to win in a

number of the contests. If we fail, we may be somewhat disappointed, but we are not going to be discouraged. Whatever may be the results, we are going to lend our hearts and our hands—and our voices—towards making the rally the grandest affair ever witnessed in old St. Tammany.

trustees shall make written recommendation to the parish superintendent and his decision shall be final. Local trustees do not have the right to suspend or expel any pupil. The length of time during suspension shall be in force as matters to be decided upon by the trustees and the parish superintendent. The principal has only the primary right to suspend; re-instatement being absolutely within the power of the local trustees and parish superintendent.

3. Trustees are subject to call of the parish superintendent, whenever he deems a conference necessary.

4. The local trustees shall represent and recommend to the superintendent and parish board of school directors such needs and requirements of their school as may be within the power of the parish school board to grant, and shall be their special duty to look after the sanitary welfare of their school; calling in the assistance of the superintendent and parish board when necessary.

5. Trustees shall not have the right to contract with teachers as such power is vested in the parish board of school directors.

Note.—The parish superintendent will not care to invest gate any complaint in a school until he gets a report from the local trustees, because he feels that the trustees who are on the spot should be able to assist him in reaching a just and impartial decision.

DUTIES OF TEACHERS IN GRADE AND HIGH SCHOOLS.

1. Teachers shall co-operate with the principal and each other for the general welfare of the school, and a lack of co-operation will be deemed a neglect of duty and shall be considered a sufficient cause for suspension or removal.

2. Teachers must be in their rooms at least twenty minutes before opening of their school and shall record their names in rotation, with time of arrival in the principal's office.

3. They shall be held responsible for the discipline and neatness of the respective rooms and the care of the school room furniture.

4. Each and every teacher shall keep record books, make reports and furnish specimen work of pupils at the time and in the manner prescribed by the superintendent and principal.

5. It shall be the duty of all teachers to attend all meetings called by the principal and parish superintendent.

6. No teacher will be allowed to dismiss his or her school or absent himself or herself therefrom or employ a substitute without the consent of the principal or superintendent.

7. Teachers may detain pupils after school for idleness, failure in recitations, or misconduct; but such detention shall not exceed one hour in the afternoon.

8. Teachers shall not excuse pupils from any regular or special duty, nor excuse them from school without consent of the principal.

9. Teachers shall not admit a pupil to their grade without being so directed by the principal.

10. No teacher shall assume the responsibility of examining any pupil for the purpose of a change of grade, without knowledge and sanction of the principal.

11. In all cases of discipline, teachers are to avoid corporal punishment if possible, and in no case shall it be given without the special permission of the principal.

RULES FOR RURAL SCHOOLS.

1. Teachers are expected to be the first on the school grounds in the morning and the last to leave in the evening. They should not leave the premises during the noon hour nor at recess time.

2. The authority of the teacher over the pupil shall not be limited to the school house or the school grounds. While the teacher shall not be held responsible for misconduct on the way to and from school, still, they shall have the right to punish for misconduct brought to their notice.

3. No teacher shall resign without giving two weeks notice to the parish superintendent under penalty of forfeiting pay for time taught.

4. Teachers are positively forbidden to teach on Saturdays without permission from the parish superintendent.

5. Teachers are required under penalty of dismissal to not allow the use of any books in the public schools other than those adopted by the State Board of Education.

6. No teacher in a one-room school shall teach subjects required for any grade above the seventh.

Rules for Public Schools.

Rules for the public schools of St. Tammany parish adopted by the Parish School Board in regular session on Saturday, July 6, 1912:

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF LOCAL TRUSTEES.

1. The local trustees shall appoint one of their number as treasurer and he shall receive from the teacher all money collected for the school which they represent and give receipt for same. A strict account shall be kept of the way this money is spent and each treasurer shall present his books together with all original and receipted vouchers to the parish superintendent at least once a year, in order that his account may be audited.

2. In all cases of issue between principal and patron, growing out of the requirements from a pupil, the
