Folsom Graded School.

The Folsom graded school opened September 21, 1913, with Miss Jennie Pritchard, of Covington, as principal, and Misses M. A. Loderbough, of New Orleans, and M. P. Tarrey, of Fayette, Miss., as assistants.

When school opened urgent improvements were needed everywhere. The writer is glad to say the most urgent were made and others will be made.

Much to the delight of patrons and teachers, the school board generously appropriated money for a deep well at the beginning of the school term.

During the first two weeks of school the patrons and friends donated money for an addition to the library. "The ladies wanted to do their part, so they made up money for a \$21 sanitary drinking fountain, which the children appreciate very much.

The patrons responded nobly to the school board's regulation of requiring incidental fees paid in a few days after entering. Up to date the fees amount to over \$50.

The fees collected have been used for wood, crayon, cleaning, fixing windows, floors, etc., and the teachers are asking that the balance be used in purchasing a much needed dictionary.

When the rally was mentioned the pupils entered into preparation with enthusiasm, giving candy sales to raise money to buy material to make articles for same, and the writer is glad to say they raised some.

The pupils are doing good work in school and the average attendance has been good, considering some pupils come three miles.

There has been 117 pupils enrolled ranging from the first grade through the eighth.

Before I close I'll tell you the secret why our school has been getting along so well. First, we believe we can do anything any one else can and then our teachers have not been afraid of work and the patrons have co-operated with them.
