ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

The first Louisianian to sacrifice his life in his country's cause was Louis Oscar Fried, a Gretna boy, who was an ordinary seaman on the battleship Arkansas. He was killed in the fighting Wednesday.

SOMETHING FOR PARENTS AND TEACHERS.

We wonder whether second and third grade teachers have ever thought how much better off they would be if they stopped teaching for a while to earn a normal diploma. Take the \$40 teacher who works nine months and earns \$360 a year. If it costs her \$25 to live, her annual expenses are \$300, and she saves only \$60 a year or \$360 in six years, and all of this goes for summer school expenses. If such a teacher borrowed \$600 for a three year normal course, she would then teach at \$64 or \$640 a year. Taking out living expenses of \$300, she would save in the remaining three years \$720, pay the amount she borrowed, and come out as well off financially as the untrained teacher. Besides she would have a normal diploma which would bring her a monthly salary of \$20 to \$30 more than the untrained teacher and which would exempt her from going to summer school every year. To prepare training school teachers, Louisiana maintains a big institution. This is the State Normal School at Natchitoches. It represents an investment of half a million dollars, has a campus of 300 acres, over twenty buildings, and all necessary equipment. Interested parents and teachers should write for literature concerning the courses offered at the Normal School.

Be it ordained by the Municipal Board of Health, of Covington, Louisiana:

Health Ordinance No. 7
Be it ordained by the Municipal Board of Health, of Covington, Louisiana:

1. That the registration of all births and deaths hereafter occurring within the corporate limits of this municipality shall be made with the municipal clerk and ex-officio recorder of births at the town hall, in the following manner, to-wit: (a) All births (including still births) shall be reported by the physician or attendant to the above auditor within 30 days after said birth shall have occurred, together with such information as is required by the State Bureau of Vital Statistics on the subject, which birth shall be officially recorded, for which a certificate and recordation a fee of twenty-five cents shall be paid by the attendant. (b) All deaths (including still births) shall be reported by the physician in attendance or coroner, according to the rules and regulations of the State Sanitation Code. 2. Be it further ordained, That no undertaker, or person acting as such, shall bury, or otherwise dispose of the body of any person dying within the limits of this municipality, until he shall have first obtained a burial permit from the municipal clerk and ex-officio recorder of births and deaths, according to the rules and regulations of the State Sanitation Code, for which burial permit the said officer shall charge a fee of fifty cents. 3. Be it further ordained, That any person violating any of the provisions of the above ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$25, or imprisonment for a period not exceeding 30 days, or both, at the discretion of the court.
