

LEGISLATURE

state has gone forward in its development, idle lands have been made productive, waste lands have been reclaimed. Resources of state better known and capital seeking investment here.
 For the first half of the present administration, the state finds itself with a surplus in the general fund.
 Under the state debt refund of \$11,108,300, the state will pay under the new plan \$3,400,197.50 less in interest than it would have to pay had four per cent 50-year bonds been issued and sold at par, as provided by law.
 The boards of many institutions should be consolidated, and the supervision entrusted to a few men who could devote their entire time to the management. The lepers' home, school for the deaf and dumb, school for the blind improved during the year, but more remains to be done at these institutions.
 The general assembly should provide means to construct and maintain a training school for wayward boys at Monroe.
 The present system of taxation is unjust, inefficient and inadequate for the needs of the state. The state has no control over the sources of its own revenue. Plans are suggested for reform.
 The agricultural and immigration department is suffering from a lack of system. Efficient service cannot be expected as long as present conditions exist.
 The livestock sanitary board should be given more liberal support. Sugar planters are going into stock industry, and should be encouraged.
 Levee work has been continued along the old lines in the hope that the federal government may respond to its national duty by assuming full responsibility for effective control of the floods. Intelligent co-operation among the people of the valley can bring this about.
 A drainage department of the state board of engineers should be organized similar to the highway department.
 A public utility commission should be established.
 Cost of court proceedings are too great, especially in the city of New

Orleans, and should be reduced. Arrangements to pay claim of the old canal company for improvement on Old Basin canal should be made, and its management consolidated with the New Basin canal's.
 The people of the state cannot afford to tolerate or condone registration or election frauds. The general assembly should enact every law necessary further to insure honest registration and elections.
 The financial condition of the board of control is bad, owing to overflows and depression in the price of sugar. The unwise policy of relying on sugar as a source of revenue is pointed out. The advisability of sell all farms except Angola, and the purchase of lands in the northern part of the state suitable for cultivation of cotton, is suggested.
 Reform should be made in notarial work in Orleans parish. Notarial acts should be deposited and kept as records of the office where they are recorded. All mortgage notes paraphed by a notary should also be paraphed by the recorder of mortgages. The number of notaries in Orleans should not be limited. —New Orleans Item.


