RICE'S FINE FARM.

I recently visited the farm owned by Mr. Rice, of New Orleans, and I was so much impressed with the natural advantages of the place that I feel it my duty to have a word to say about it.

The place is along side Bogue Falaya river and has natural drainage. The soil is sandy loam with sand-clay foundation and is well suited to truck crops.

The flowing wells are on the place and irrigation would be an easy matter as the lay of the land is favorable to it.

Any implement that a man needs is to be found here on this place and all needed to make this farm a paying one is to properly plow, fertilize and cultivate the crops in the right manner. I am sure that this place could be placed on a paying basis next year if the right kind of fertil-

izer is used and in sufficient quantity. Melons, corn, oats, Irish potatoes, kudzu, tomatoes and cane are being grown this year but not in great quantities to bring in much returns. If this entire farm could be cultivated along the lines recommended by the government it would be something grand, and it is my desire that next year this will be in order to show what can be done on St. Tammany soil.
