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District Court.

District court was in session this week. Judge Lancaster on the bench and District Attorney Vol Brock prosecuting. The following cases were tried:

State vs. Isaac Talley, Linas and Evans Jones, plead guilty to disturbing the peace, sentenced \$20 each and costs of court, in default of payment four months in jail.

State vs. R. J. Parker, disturbing the peace, \$5 and costs, in default of payment 30 days in jail.

State vs. W. Stewart, disturbing the peace, \$20 and costs, in default of payment of fine and costs four months in jail.

State vs. Will Parker, Zella Jones and Silas Shilling, disturbing the peace, \$5 each, and costs.

State vs. Ed. Crawford et als, disturbing the peace, \$5 each, and costs.

State vs. Sam Murray, robbery, 5 years in penitentiary.

State vs. Dan Brown, plead guilty to disturbing peace, \$25 and costs, in default of payment, 90 days in jail.

State vs. Adolphus Brown, petit larceny, plead guilty, sentenced to 6 months in jail.

State vs. Jas. Blanchard, carrying concealed weapons, plead guilty, fined \$50 and costs, in default of payment one year in jail.

State vs. Tom Allen, assault and battery, fined \$25 and costs, in default 60 days in jail.

State vs. Tucker Oredon, petit larceny, 15 days in jail and costs, in default of payment of costs 15 days additional.

State vs. Grant Thomas, carrying concealed weapons, fined \$50 and costs, and in default of payment one year in jail.

State vs. Will Strickland, assault with intent to kill, 20 years in State penitentiary.

State vs. Monroe Brown, plead guilty to petit larceny, 15 days in jail and costs, and in default of payment 15 days additional.

State vs. Elbert and Luella Strain, disturbing the peace, fined \$25 each and costs, in default of payment 30 days in jail.

State vs. Jessie Raymond, assault with intent to rape, sentenced to 20 years in penitentiary.

3 DAIRIES ORDERED TO STOP SHIPPING MILK INTO NEW ORLEANS.

Three Louisiana dairies were ordered Thursday by the State Board of Health to suspend their shipments of milk to New Orleans. The order was addressed by State Analyst Taylor to J. M. Chapin, Roseland; W. F. Waller, Flukey, and E. F. Marrero, Covington.

These dairies were among several inspected Wednesday in those sections by Inspector Slack and were found to be in such condition as to endanger persons drinking their milk, according to the health authorities.

In the instance of J. M. Chapin it was found that besides the dairy being in bad condition, several children of his family, who live on the milk farm, are suffering from the measles. To have any of these children to handle the milk pails, would spread the disease.

Two other dairies were found below the board's standard. They were those of P. S. Estrad and D. Mahoume, both serving milk in Covington. Inspector Slack ordered them to discontinue business until requirements of the board are met.

While in Covington Inspector Slack found one of the best dairies so far found in the State, from a sanitary standpoint. This was the dairy of H. P. Bougere, whose score reached 90 1-2, the best score on record in the health office.—Daily States.
