LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.
Senate.
 The Senate passed twenty-three House bills in two hours, including nine bills composing the program of conservation legislation.
 The Lafayette commission on government charter bill passed.
 Five-mile limit anti-gambling bills had a narrow escape, one being defeated.
House.
 The Clayton and Roberts tax assessment reform bills failed to pass. The Earhardt bill providing for nonpartisan election of members of

the New Orleans School Board passed.
 The Fontenot bill making United States Senators elective by the people passed.
 Mr. Generally introduced a bill for a bond issue of \$2,000,000, to be used in reconstructing New Orleans public school buildings.
 Mr. Claiborne introduced a bill creating a legislative commission to investigate State officers, departments, institutions, public schools, etc.—Times-Picayune, June 26.

TEN THOUSAND RESIDENTS ARE HOMELESS—GREAT AREA LEFT IN RUINS.
 Salem, Mass., June 25.—Nearly half the "Old Witch City" of Salem, rich in historic buildings and tradition, was devastated today and tonight by a fire that caused an estimated loss of \$20,000,000; destroyed 1000 buildings, including a score of manufacturing establishments, and made 10,000 of the 45,000 residents homeless.
 The fire originated in the Horn Leather Factory, on the west side of the city, about 2 o'clock in the afternoon and swept through the shoe and leather manufacturing district, ruining every building in a curving path two miles long and more than a half mile wide.
 Burning embers, carried by a strong northwest wind, started fires in two other sections, the fashionable residential district adjacent to Lafayette street and a manufacturing and tenement house district on the peninsula bounded by Halmers Cove, south river and water front.
FOLSOM LUMBER COMPANY IN BANKRUPTCY.
 The schedules in bankruptcy of the Folsom Lumber Company, of St. Tammany parish, were filed in the United States District Court on Wednesday afternoon. The liabilities are shown to be \$27,097.15, and the assets \$7,600.
 The unsecured claims amount to \$24,955.93 and the secured claims to \$1,654.
 The principal assets mentioned are stock in trade, \$6,000, and machinery and tools valued at \$1,000.
 The Mandeville postoffice has been promoted to the presidential appointment class.
