Folsom school houses, including the repair of roof, were opened, and were found to be as follows:

James A. Wilson, Onward, Middle Roads and Oak Grove schools, each \$150; Folsom school, \$288, which includes the repair of the roof.

J. D. Fauntleroy, Middle Roads and Oak Grove schools for \$170 each. A. B. Guyot, Onward school, for \$175. Folsom school, for \$333.

Quave & Boudousque, Middle Roads, Onward and Oak Grove schools for the sum of \$465, for the three. Folsom school, \$320.

J. A. Hawley, for the Onward, Middle Roads and Oak Grove schools, \$310 each. Folsom school for \$195; or the entire four buildings for \$475.

Jacob Biery, Onward school at \$118. Oak Grove school \$120.00; Middle Roads school, \$120.00; Folsom school, \$333.00.

All of the four schools for \$688. P. A. Ross, Oak Grove school for \$154.75.

Thos. Lacroix, Folsom school, for \$350. Onward, Middle Roads and Oak Grove for \$225 each. All of the above bids for the painting of the Folsom school includes the repair of the room with a guarantee against leaks for one year.

Middle Roads school for \$139.40, by Alex. Taylor and W. M. Galloway. Moved by Mr. Kahl, seconded by Dr. Farmer, that the painting of the entire four school houses be given to Mr. Hawley, at his bid of \$475.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Fauntleroy, and seconded by Mr. Parker that Mr. J. A. Hawley be required to give a bond for one-half of the contract price through a bonding company within the next ten days, and if he fails to do this that the contract shall go to the next lowest bidder.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Mr. Crawford, that the payments for the painting of these buildings be made upon certificate of the ward director (H. T. Fauntleroy), who shall inspect the work carefully and examine the quality of the material used. Mr. Kahl, Crawford, Liddle, FitzSimons, No. Parker, Farmer, Fauntleroy.

Carried. Moved by Dr. Farmer and seconded by Mr. Kahl, that the Alton colored school shall hereafter be held in the school building heretofore used for the white school, and that a donation from the patrons of the Alton colored school of \$125, for the benefit of the eighth ward special tax fund be accepted.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Liddle, that the board donate the sum of \$10 from the general fund for the benefit of the Simmons Creek school library, and also the school a book case.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Mr. Liddle, that the board donate the sum of \$5 from the general fund for the benefit of the Covington high school library.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Crawford and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the secretary be instructed to refund to the tax collector the sum of ninety-five cents, as the amount received for poll tax of B. H. Buckley, this tax being collected twice.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Crawford and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the new proposed Fendlasson school house be built from the first available funds from the fund where was special fund, and that the committee appointed at the last meeting be instructed to advertise for bids as soon as the funds are sufficient.

Carried. The following petition from the patrons of the Sun and Line Graded schools were received:

Sun, La., July 4, 1914. The Honorable President and Members St. Tammany Parish School Board:

Gentlemen:—Whereas, the honorable State Board of Education did, on April 15, 1914, pass a rule that schools of two teachers should not teach over seven grades; and

Whereas, we, the patrons and friends of the Sun and Line Graded schools feel that the need of a public school where the higher grades may be taught; and

Whereas, we can see no other way for our children to have such advantages except by consolidating our two above named schools; therefore be it

Resolved, That we petition your honorable body to consolidate these schools and build a four room school house to be situated at some convenient spot east of the railroad.

Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Mr. Fauntleroy, that the Sun and Line Graded schools be consolidated, and that the following committee be appointed to select a site and secure title for the same: W. H. Kahl, Walter Pierce, John H. Wood and W. W. Carried.

It was understood as a part of the duties of this committee to advertise for bids for this school house as soon as a site has been secured.

Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Mr. Crawford, that Mr. Parker be instructed to have the entire grounds of the Talbot school fenced and bring in at the next regular meeting of the board a bill for the wire and labor.

Carried. The following petition from the patrons of the Pilgrim Rest school was presented:

Covington, La., May 16, 1914. To the Honorable President and Members of the School Board St. Tammany Parish, La.

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned patrons and tax payers of the second ward, respectfully petition your honorable body for the construction of a new school building at or near the old Pilgrim Rest school building.

Respectfully signed, By forty-four patrons and tax payers.

Moved by Mr. Kahl and seconded by Dr. Farmer, that the matter of a new school house for the Pilgrim Rest school be tabled until the next meeting.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Fauntleroy and seconded by Mr. Kahl, that the board for the proposed Alton-Gause consolidated school and that the bids be approved of the advertisement for bids opened by the president of the board, who is hereby authorized to act for the board in the awarding of the

contract. Carried. Moved by Mr. Fauntleroy and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the superintendent be instructed that he shall not employ a man and wife for teachers in any school of this parish.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Kahl, that the superintendent be authorized to give some of the second hand desks from the Covington white school to the Covington colored school, provided the title of the colored school property be given to the parish school board.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Kahl, that second hand desks from the Covington white school be given the Ramsey white school, provided the superintendent and president of the school board think best.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Kahl, that the purchase order for the Dunbar school and the same to be paid for from the eighth ward special school fund.

Carried. Moved by Mr. Fauntleroy and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the board furnish lumber and nails for a foot walk to the Onward school, and also for the Folsom school across the Boque Falaya river, provided the patrons will put up the bridge free from cost to the school board.

The trustees of each of the above schools are authorized to supervise the work and instructed to approve of all bills for lumber and nails before the same will be paid by the board.

Carried. Moved by Dr. Farmer and seconded by Mr. Fauntleroy, that the public schools of the parish be opened on the first Monday in September.

THE STRAWBERRY PROPOSITION. The following letter received by Dr. W. L. Stevenson dissipates the big idea about the growing of 10,000 crates of strawberries in St. Tammany parish through the Dreyer Drug Co. proposition spoken of in the Farmer June 27. However, there may be something in it in the future. It would be a great advantage in the growing of strawberries to be able to dispose of the remaining berries after the first shipments had been made to the high-priced markets, and it may result in the establishment of a packing plant here by the Reilly Co. Charleston, S. C., July 8, 1914. St. Tammany Canning Co., Covington, Louisiana. Gentlemen:—We are in receipt of your favor of the 26th ult., and beg to thank you for your prompt attention to same. It is difficult for us to estimate the number of strawberries we will require, inasmuch as we have just started this line of business, and consequently will not know our needs until our sales force is well organized, and we can arrive at some idea of the volume of business we will do, and consequently the amount of strawberries we can use. For the above reason we have decided it will be advisable not to enter into a contract with the growers for the coming season, but instead, draw our line of strawberries from markets where strawberries are grown each year. We are pleased to say, however, that your proposition seems very favorable to our placing a plant, there in the near future, and in the event that the strawberries are grown, any way, it is entirely probable that we may decide about the latter part of this year or the first of next to install a plant at Covington, provided there will be sufficient strawberries for our use, which we estimate will be about 5,000 crates. We cannot use strawberries at a high price, and think the price we would be able to pay for our purpose would be \$1.50 to \$1.75 per crate. We will probably take the matter up with you at some later date. Beg to thank you again for your courtesy. D. E. REILLY CO.
