War News

Paris, Aug. 27, 10:25 p. m.—The following official bulletin was issued by the War Office to-night:

"In the Vosges district our troops to-day resumed the offensive and drove back the Germans who yesterday had forced them to retire on the Salm-Die Side."

"The Germans yesterday bombarded Saint Die, an unfortified town. Thousands of Bodies Found."

"In the region between the Vosges and Nancy, our offensive movement has continued uninterruptedly for five days. The German losses have been considerable; 2500 bodies were found on a front of three kilometers southeast of Nancy and 4500 bodies on a front of four kilometers in the region of Vitrimont."

"Longwy, an old fortress, the garrison of which consisted of only one battalion, which had been bombarded Aug. 3, capitulated to-day after holding out for more than twenty-four days. More than half the garrison was killed or wounded. Lieutenant Colonel Darce, Governor of Longwy, has been nominated an officer of the Legion of Honor for heroic conduct in the defense of Longwy."

"On the Meuse our troops have repulsed with great vigor several German attacks. A German flag was taken."

Belgian Army Joins Allies. "The Belgian field army attached to Namur and a French regiment which supported it have joined our lines."

"In the north the British have attacked forces greatly superior in number and were obliged, after brilliant resistance, to withdraw a little in the rear of their right."

"Our armies maintained their positions in Belgium. The army of Antwerp has drawn out and held before it several German divisions."

"In certain regions of the north inhabitants of towns and villages have been frightened by the appearance of scouts of the enemy. These are passing incursions which can happen in any war, and need cause no alarm, as they do not at all indicate imminent occupation by the enemy."

Russians Still Advancing. "The German troops retired from the region of Masuren in East Prussia after the Russian victory. The Russian advance is unretarded in that country, which presents difficulties, and the outlet of which to the west was occupied yesterday. It was confirmed that 100 cannon were taken from the enemy."

Paris Prepares for Siege. Paris, it was officially announced to-day, is preparing for a possible siege. The matter was discussed by the new Minister of War, Alexandre Millerand, with the subordinates of his department, and steps were taken to determine the exact measures necessary to place the city in a state to withstand an attack and invasion."

M. Millerand will meet with the other officials of the War Office every morning for the consideration of developments and every possible phase in connection with an entrenched camp such as the capital will become."

Wounded Are Sent Away. The government is taking precautions to send most of the wounded to Southern and Western France. The wounded in Northern France are not permitted to remain here."

Americans and other foreigners in the capital are beginning to understand that their presence here will not be desirable. British Now Occupying Strong Line, With French Supporting Both Flanks.

London, Aug. 28, 12:40 a. m.—The British Press Bureau at 12:30 o'clock this morning gave out the following statement:

"The French operations of war over a distance of some 250 miles have necessitated certain changes in the position of our troops, who are now occupying a strong line to meet the German advance, supported by the French army on both flanks."

"The morale of both armies appears to be excellent and there is little doubt that they will give good account of themselves in the positions they now hold."

Von Der Goltz Governor of Belgium; Austrian Emperor Congratulates the Kaiser.

London, Aug. 27, 10:30 p. m.—The Marconi Company to-night received the following German official wireless dispatch:

"Field Marshal von der Goltz, who has been trusted by the Emperor with the administration of that part of Belgium in the possession of Germany, has left for Belgium to enter upon his duties as Governor-general. The civil administration has been entrusted to the president of the Government Board at Aix-la-Chapelle, Baron von Sandt, on whom the title of excellency has been conferred. He will be known as the chief administrator."

"The King of Bavaria," the dispatch continues, "has left for the western theater of war."

"German aeroplanes to-day passed over the frontier forts at Antwerp. Attacks upon them were without result."

"Emperor William has received the following telegram from the Emperor of Austria:

"Victory after victory, God is with you. He will be with us also. I most sincerely congratulate you, dear friend, also the young heroes, your dear son, the Crown Prince, and the Crown Prince Rupprecht, as well as the incomparably brave German army. Words fail to express what moves me, and with me my army, in these days of world history."

AMERICAN TOBACCO COMPANY ASSISTANCE TO MERCHANTS.

New Ruling Gives Tobacco Customers Until October 25th to Discount Bills.

New York, Aug. 24.—President P. S. Hill, of the American Tobacco Company, has sent the following notice to all the company's customers in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina,

Tennessee and Texas:

"We have become aware of the embarrassment brought on the cotton growing sections by the European war, and the resulting inability to market cotton crops. We earnestly hope and believe that this embarrassment is temporary. We are earnestly anxious, though, to contribute, so far as we can, to the relief of it. On that account we will permit our customers in the States above mentioned to discount their bills, on account of purchases made hereafter, within ten days after October 15, 1914. This applies to all purchases of all our lines, and whether of drop shipments or stock shipments."
