War News

is invading Konigsberg. The Russian victory, which is complete, at Lemberg, already has been announced.

Paris, Sept. 3.—In an official statement issued to-day, the War Office says:

"There has been no contact with the German forces in the region of Compeigne and Senlis since yesterday. Precautions have been taken to stop any offensive movement of the enemy.

"Measures also have been taken to provide for the pursuit of German aeroplanes, especially those of the armored type, which will be prevented from flying over Paris.

"The situation in the northeast is the same as yesterday.

Paris Calmly Awaits German Attack; People Eager to See Airplane Battle.

Paris, Sept. 3, 4:22 p. m.—An immense and complicated system of intrenchments is being constructed outside the city. It is reported that the engineers in charge of the work are keeping several hundred thousand men busy.

Beginning to-night, no person may leave or enter Paris between 8 p. m. and 5 a. m., without a military pass. Automobiles may enter freely during the day, but cannot leave without permits. Pedestrians are permitted to pass without challenge through certain gates, while other gates are closed. Gardeners bringing fresh vegetables to the city are permitted access at half-hour intervals during the night.

Will Transfer Bank. The government will issue a proclamation to-morrow transferring the Bank of France from Paris to Bordeaux.

It was announced to-day that the Paris Bourse, which was closed yesterday, would remain closed indefinitely.

The Temps announces its intention to follow the government to Bordeaux and publish there.

Will Fulfill Order. Gen. Gallieni, commander of the army defending the city, to-day issued the following proclamation to the inhabitants of Paris:

"The members of the government of the republic have left Paris in order to give a new impetus to the defense of the nation. I have been ordered to defend Paris against the invader. This order I will fulfill to the end. (Signed) 'GALLIENI. Military Governor of Paris, Commanding the Army of Paris.

News Taken Calmly. Paris again to-day showed its remarkable adaptability to circumstances. Though all illusions to such a contingency had been forbidden strictly in the newspapers, that the government would be transferred to Bordeaux was an open secret several days ago among journalists and public officials and in military circles.

Among these persons the effect of the announcement had been largely discounted. The public, after its first surprise in viewing the situation with composure, and to-night there seems to be a better feeling all around.

Military secrets are being guarded so well that all reference to them is largely speculation; but it is a reasonable supposition that General Joffre prefers to accept a decisive battle against the Germans in front of the forts and the entrenched camp of Paris.

Predicts Final Success. The Temps this evening printed another article in which it predicted final success for the allies. The newspaper's reasons for its optimism are contained in the following resume of the situation as the Temps sees it:

"Diminution of pressure by the enemy on the extreme left of the allied line, absolute inactivity in the center, and the progress of the French troops in Lorraine and on the right bank of the canal which passes a few miles north of Luneville, in the department of Meurthe-et-Moselle."

These circumstances are taken by the Temps as evidence that the enemy has been hard hit and is suffering from losses in men and lack of supplies.

Reports German Defeat. The Liberte quotes an English officer who arrived here to-day from Pierrefitte, twenty-eight miles southeast of Pau, as saying he was wounded in a fierce battle near Compeigne, in which the Germans were driven back several times with heavy losses. He said the French and English offensive was successful over a front of several miles, the Germans retreating toward the left.

Paris was disappointed to-day because no German aeroplane flew over the city. Crowds gathered in the Place de la Concorde, the Place de la Bourse, the Place de l'Etoile and the Quai des Tuileries from 4 o'clock in the afternoon until 7, to watch for the aeroplane, but none came.

Several French machines patrolled the sky, ready to engage the enemy.

GIACOMO DELLA CHIUSA CHOSEN POPE.

Rome, Sept. 3.—The Sacred College of Cardinals to-day elected Cardinal Giacomo Della Chiesa, archbishop of Bologna, Supreme Pontiff to succeed the late Pope Pius X. His coronation as Benedict XV will take place Sept. 6.

Immediately after his election the Pontiff said he could not imagine how his frail being could endure the enormous weight of responsibility thrown on his shoulders, especially at a moment when almost all the countries of Europe were stained with blood; when wounds inflicted upon humanity also were inflicted on the church, and when countless victims of the war were being cut down.

The war, he said, had armed faithful against faithful, priest against priest; while bishops of each country offered prayers for the success of the army of his own nation. But victory for one side meant slaughter to the other, the destruction of children equally dear to the heart of the Pontiff.



