E. P. SINGLETARY.

E. P. Singletary died in Covington Sunday, November 8, 1914, after a short illness, at his residence, aged 42 years, 8 months, 23 days. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. M. M. Singletary, and three sisters, Mrs. Annie Smith, Mrs. J. E. Reiley, Miss Alice Singletary, of South Carolina, and one sister in Covington, Miss Carrie Singletary, four brothers, J. E. and Chas. F. Singletary, of South Carolina; J. B. Singletary, of Abita City, and A. J. Singletary, of Covington, La.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at the Baptist church at 3:30 o'clock, Rev. J. E. Brakefield, of Bogalusa, officiating. The pall bearers from the residence were U. G. Neuhauser, of Slidell; L. T. Miles, of Slidell; Harry Meakie, Chas. Diehl, A. C. McCormack and H. J. Ostendorf, of Covington.

ORDINANCE NO. 29.

An ordinance fixing the time of residence in the town limits of the

town of Abita Springs, La., to enable a voter otherwise qualified to vote in municipal elections held in the town of Abita Springs, La., and providing for a registration book to be kept by the clerk of the town council in which all voters shall be registered before they will be eligible to vote at municipal elections.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Abita Springs, La., That in addition to possessing all other qualifications necessary to become a voter as required by the State laws, every person to vote in any municipal election held in the town of Abita Springs, La., must have been an actual bona fide resident within the corporate limits of the town of Abita Springs, La., for at least six (6) months prior to the election, at which he offers to vote, and must be registered as a voter as required by this ordinance.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the clerk of the town council is hereby authorized and directed to keep a book in which he is directed to enter the names of all who apply to register to vote in municipal election, on them complying with the provisions of this ordinance, he shall keep blanks on hand and every person who applies to register must make the following oath, before said clerk, to-wit: "I am a qualified voter of the State of Louisiana and the 10th Ward of the Parish of St. Tammany, and I have resided within the corporate limits of the town of Abita Springs, Louisiana, for more than six (6) months and I am not registered in any other municipality." When the clerk has sworn the voter and he has signed the above application the clerk will enroll him as a voter. The clerk will close his registration book thirty (30) days before an election and no person whose name is not inscribed on said book will be permitted to vote.

Section 3. Be it further resolved, etc., That all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Charter of
A. V. SMITH, INC.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it known that on this the 14th day of October, A. D., 1914, before me, Robert L. Aubert, a Notary Public, duly qualified, in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, therein residing, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, and declared that they and any other persons who may hereafter join or become associated with them, had formed themselves into a corporation, in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, for a period of ninety-nine years from this date, under the name of A. V. Smith Company, Inc., the domicile whereof shall be in the town of Covington, parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and the purposes whereof shall be to handle incidental to said business a line of general merchandise, as may be deemed necessary.

No stockholder shall be liable for any of the debts or obligations of said company, except to the amount that may be due by each stockholder for the unpaid balance of his subscription to the stock of said company.

Citation and other process shall be served upon the president, or in his absence the vice president, or in the absence of the vice president, or the secretary-treasurer.

The capital stock shall be six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars, divided into sixty (60) shares of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each. The corporation shall begin business as soon as three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars shall have been subscribed for and paid in.

The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by the Board of Directors, composed of three stockholders, to be elected annually by ballot at a stockholders meeting to be held on the first Monday in October of each year, excepting that for the present year the following stockholders shall constitute the Board of Directors: James M. Walker, New Orleans, La.; Joseph Delery, Covington, La.; and A. V. Smith, Covington, La., of whom James M. Walker shall be president, Joseph Delery vice president, and A. V. Smith secretary and treasurer. Succeeding Boards of Directors shall elect officers from among their number.

Stockholders meetings may be held when ordered by the Board of Directors or the holders of twenty-five per cent of the outstanding stock. Notice of all stockholders meetings, other than adjourned meetings, shall be given by written notice to each stockholder and deposited in post-office, properly addressed, at least fifteen days before such meeting.

This charter may be amended or this corporation dissolved by a two-thirds vote of the outstanding stock at a meeting called by the Board of Directors, after having given notice to each stockholder, in writing, stating the purpose for which said meeting is called, and deposited in post-office, properly addressed, at least fifteen days before such meeting.

In case of dissolution the Board of Directors shall act as liquidators. The Board of directors shall have power to adopt by-laws for the general management of the affairs of the corporation and can amend same at their pleasure.

The corporation shall enjoy all rights and privileges granted by law to corporations and shall sue a corporate seal.
