Lyon expects to resort to unique means to draw the reins on the pranks of Don Cupid among his scholars. In the future only homely teachers, who are guaranteed to frown on all love-making among students, will find favor in the educator's eyes. The long established custom of employing only handsome and charming young women to train St. Tammany's youths has been placed under a ban.

Superintendent Lyon has also issued his dictum against all kissing games, and note writing, and insists on basketball and athletic sports as the proper recess diversion.

In one school on Tuesday, two pupils were suspended, and it is thought that this action will have the desired effect on the loveless damsels and swains.

The above article, which is taken from Thursday's Times-Picayune, was read to Supt.
