ST. TAMMANY CANNING CO.

At a meeting of the St. Tammany Canning Company held December 31, 1914, it was shown by the report of operations that vegetables can be canned at a profit, and that farmers are now raising vegetables in a larger quantity than the company is able to handle, and that only a small part of the vegetables tended were purchased. A mass meeting will be held at the courthouse January 15th for the purpose of raising funds to extend and enlarge the operations of the cannery. It is hoped that farmers and businessmen will attend this meeting and show a proper interest in an enterprise that should be of great assistance in stimulating the growth of farm products in St. Tammany parish.
