CHARTER of the J. C. BURNS & CO., INC.
United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

On this 6th day of January A. D. 1915, before me, Thos. M. Burns, a Notary Public, in and for the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, personally came and appeared Oscar M. Burch, Robenia Burns and Albert Burns, all three residents of the town of Covington, said parish and State, who severally declared that they do hereby form and organize themselves into a corporation for a term of ninety-nine years from this date, under the name of J. C. Burns & Co., Inc., the domicile whereof is fixed in the town of Covington, Louisiana, and its objects and purposes and business being general retail merchandise, buying and selling all kinds of goods, wares and merchandise, including buying and selling fresh meats, poultry and live stock of all kinds, and to do generally all things necessary connected or arising out of the within objects and purposes; citation shall be served on the president, and in his absence or her absence on the vice president or secretary-treasurer.

The capital stock shall be fixed at six thousand (\$6,000) dollars, divided into shares of one hundred (\$100) dollars each, payable in exchange for property, as list of description and valuation, hereto annexed and made part hereof.

The affairs shall be managed by a Board of Directors composed of three (3) stockholders, to be elected by the stockholders, annually, by ballot, on the second Monday in January, or any subsequent day fixed by the Board, in case of no election taking place on said day. Each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote. Said Board shall have the right to make all by-laws and change and alter the same as pleasure. The company shall begin business as soon as six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars has been subscribed and paid for. The first Board shall be composed of Oscar M. Burch, Robenia Burns and Albert Burns, all residents of Covington, Louisiana, of whom Robenia Burns shall be president, Albert Burns, vice president, and Oscar M. Burch, secretary-treasurer, and shall hold office until the second Monday in January, 1916, or until their successors are elected and take their place.

That the capital stock of this corporation may be increased to ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars, at the option of the Board.

That this corporation may be dissolved and liquidated as provided by Sections 28, etc., of Act No. 267 of the year 1914, and other existing laws.
