ESCAPES BRITISH DETENTION CAMP ON FRUIT VESSEL

Kingston, Jamaica, Camp Awful Says Stowaway, Held at New York.

New York, April 8.—When the United Fruit steamer, Santa Marta reached quarantine today, a stowaway was turned over to the immigration authorities. He said he had escaped from the detention camp at Kingston, Jamaica, after having been imprisoned there since August 10, 1914.

The stowaway, Walter Blank, a German, 33 years old, was turned over to Immigration Inspector O'Conner, and will be held at Ellis Island until some disposition is made of his case. Blank, who said that over 600 Germans are imprisoned at the camp, which has been named "the upper camp" because it is situated on a hill to the rear of the city of Kingston, told the following story of his escape: "If I had not made my escape from that terrible place," he said, "I would have starved to death. I tipped the scales at 123 pounds when I was arrested and now I only weigh 90."

Blank looked as if he might have lost considerable weight during the last four months. He was thin to the point of emaciation. He continued: "You may not believe me, but it is nevertheless a fact that my daily ration of food consisted of one ounce each of meat and rice, one potato, a spoonful of butter and black bread the lack of food, but the tea was terrible. I simply had to leave the awful place."

Blank said that he was able to elude his captors because of the fact that he had been employed as an able seaman on the Santa Marta up until the time of his arrest in Kingston because of his nationality. His quiet behavior at the camp, he said, soon won him the privilege of a trusty, and when he saw the Santa Marta entering the harbor Saturday he decided to make a break for liberty. He walked out of the main gate of the camp unmolested, he declares, and took his time in walking to the quay where the steamer was berthed. "I got on board," said the stowaway, "by hand-over-hand climbing up one of the Santa Marta's hawsers. It was high noon, and although there were many persons about no one attempted to interfere with me. As soon as I reached the boat deck I hid in one of the lifeboats until after we had left the harbor, when I made my presence known. If I did not leave the camp the way I did I would never have been able to get away, because at night the gates are heavily guarded with soldiers, while the barred wire entanglements that completely surround the camp are charged with electricity."

Rev. H. B. Williams, colored minister, dropped dead, last Friday. Cause of death was heart failure.
