New Orleans Gets Baseball Hunch.

(Continued from page 1) tional institutions of the city and for the purpose of organizing and promoting the many projects to which his helping hand has been applied.

The exercises were opened by W. W. Young, master of ceremonies, who, after a brief opening speech, introduced Mayor Behrman. His Honor spoke in behalf of New Orleans and in turn gave way to Robert H. Baugh, president of the Southern League, who accepted the park on behalf of the Southern League.

Heinemann Honored. The conclusion of Mayor Behrman's speech brought forth one of the most pleasant features of the day. This was the presentation, to President Heinemann, by a number of his friends and admirers, of a diamond horseshoe stick pin, a silver loving cup and a beautiful floral horseshoe. The latter was placed over Mr. Heinemann's neck while photographers "shot" him to their heart's content, a battery of regular camera men and also a number of "movie" grinders being on hand.

After the game, President Heinemann extended a vote of thanks to the women of New Orleans whose aid in the "Kop the Kup" campaign had so much to do with attracting the great crowd to the park.

"I am unable to thank each member of the woman's committee in person at the present time," said the baseball official, "but I want you to state for me just how much I appreciate their efforts to make the day a success. I hope that we will win the Kavanagh Cup. I think that we have a splendid chance to do so judging from the size of yesterday's crowd. For a week-day game it was a wonder.

"To-night we will know just what our competitors did. Not until then will we know the winner. However no matter which city takes it, I wish to state to the ladies of New Orleans that their efforts are appreciated most highly, and I wish them to feel, also, that they have not been in vain."

Mayor Pitches First Ball. After all the preliminary exercises were finished yesterday, the song on the home players' bench, promptly at 2:30 p. m., sounded the signal for the starting of play in the 1915 season and the great crowd settled back to watch the Pelicans and Barons fight out the first battle of the championship series. Umpires O'Toole and Chestnut, both of whom were members of the umpire staff of 1914 met Manager Molesworth and Manager Doherty of the opposing teams, and talked over the rules governing the day's game, then the New Orleans players took their positions in the field and Mayor Behrman walked to the pitcher's box. Here, after the signal "play ball" was given by Umpire O'Toole, His Honor pitched a brand new ball to Catcher Higgins, in token of the opening of the season.

Then came the real game, during which the fans alternately cheered or roared at the players, for good or bad plays, as they might have been "ragged" by the umpires, or shouted themselves hoarse at some great play. It was a typical holiday crowd—a ball game crowd—and a typical opening day game.

Birmingham, April 15.—With a paid attendance of 11,362, Birmingham clinched the Kavanagh attendance sup offered to the Southern League club drawing the largest opening day crowd, duplicating its feat of last year. The official figures given out yesterday after the Mobile-Birmingham game which opened the 1915 season in Baronville spelled doom for New Orleans as far as "Kopping the Kup" was concerned for the locals. But it cannot be said that the Pelican backers did not make a game and very effective race, for they were close on the heels of the Barons.

PARISH SCHOOL BOARD (Continued from Last Week)

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Dr. Farmer, that School District No. 10 as defined by a resolution of the board at a special meeting held on Friday, December 29, 1912, shall be divided into two school districts to be known as District No. 10 and No. 11. That District No. 10 be the south end of the present No. 10, and District No. 11 to be the north end of the present District No. 10. The division line to be as follows: Starting at the east line of ward (and old district No. 10) at corners of sections 22 and 27, thence going west on section line between sections 22 and 27, 21 and 23, 20 and 29, 19 and 30, of township 6 south, range 12 east, and through the east half of sections 24 and 25 to west line of ward 10 in township 6 south, range 11 east, Greensburg District of Louisiana. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Dutsch and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the Keopp school be consolidated with the Madisonville school and transfers be put in to convey all of the Keopp school pupils together with all pupils above the fifth grade living in the Edwards school neighborhood to the Madisonville school. These transfers shall go up the so-called Turpike Road as far as the line of the Baton Rouge, Hammond & Eastern Railroad. Carried.

Mr. G. E. Millar presented the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Whereas, in the opinion of this board it is necessary and advisable that a special election be ordered to be held in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, at which there shall be submitted the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of five (.005) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation annually for a period of ten years for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public schools of the said School District.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500.00) dollars to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said School District No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public; therefore,

Be it resolved by the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, in legal session convened, as follows:

Section 1. That a special election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., on Friday, the second day of July, 1915, at which there shall be submitted the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of five (.005) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to State taxation annually for a period of ten years, for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public schools of the said school district.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500.00) dollars to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said school district No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public.

Section 2. That the secretary of this Board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at the said special election a sufficient number of ballots on each of which shall be printed all of the propositions mentioned in section one of this resolution arranged in such a manner as to enable the voters to vote on each one separately and in the following form:

And that the secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, list of voters and compiled statements of voters in number and amount.

Section 3. That the polling place of said election shall be at the Garden District school house in said district No. 11, and the following commissioners and clerk are appointed: S. E. Rayne, Alfred Heath and E. P. Jesse, commissioners, and Frank Dutsch, clerk, to serve at said polling place at said election, all of whom shall serve without compensation, and said election shall be conducted under the laws of the State applicable thereto.

Section 4. The president of this board is hereby authorized to give notice of the special election herein ordered, by his proclamation to be published according to law, and in said proclamation shall announce said proclamation shall announce that at 10 o'clock a. m., on the 3rd day of July, 1915, this board will meet at its usual meeting place in Covington, La., and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election.
