THOUSANDS ASK MERCY FOR FRANK. Letters Pour in on Governor Asking Commutation of Sentence.

Atlanta, Ga., April 23.—More than fifteen thousand letters dealing with the Leo M. Frank case have been received by Governor Slaton within the last few weeks, according to information given out here today by attaches of the governor's office. With very few exceptions the writers urged the governor to commute Frank's sentence on the charge of having murdered Mary Phagan from death to life imprisonment.

The letters are being tied in bundles and stacked away pending consideration by the state prison commission and the governor of Frank's application for commutation of sentence. Members of the prison commission stated that they have received about 100 letters urging clemency for Frank, and that several hundred other writers have addressed letters to Governor-elect N. E. Harris, at Mason, in view of the probability that Governor Slaton may not be able to act upon Frank's appeal before his term expires July 1 next.

Members of the prison commission said today that no date has been set for the hearing of Frank's application for commutation of sentence, and that none will be set until after the mandate of the United States supreme court denying Frank's appeal in habeas corpus proceedings has been filed in the federal district court here. According to the commission it will not be possible to give a hearing on Frank's plea before the first Monday in June.

It is expected the supreme court's mandate will be issued May 19.

BETTER TREATMENT OF SMALL FARMER IS SOUTH'S BIGGEST NEED.

Closer Relations Between Employer and Employed Urged.

Muskogee, Okla., April 28.—Closer relations between the employer and employee, crop diversification and more liberal treatment for the small farmer were urged by speakers at tonight's session of the Southern Commercial Congress as essential to the commercial development of the South.

"Both the wage earner and the employer must accept the other as partners in production," declared Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of the United States Department of Labor. "Wage earning interests cannot be promoted by obstructing legitimate commercial enterprise any more than legitimate commercial enterprise can be promoted by strangling wage earning interests. The wage earner's interest is as truly commercial as that of his employer and if you eliminate that interest, dividends disappear and the commercial system crumbles."

Mr. Post asserted that more than half the population of the United States is directly dependent upon wage earners.

"The wage earners of the country number more than one-third the whole population," he said, "of children from ten to sixteen years of age, there are at least half a million employed, not counting those in agricultural work, who number a million more."

FRENCH CRUISER BLOWN UP BY SHOT FROM SUBMARINE.

Warship With Crew of 714 Torpedoed in Strait of Otranto by Austrian.

Brindisi, Italy, Tuesday, April 28, 9:45 p. m., via Paris, April 28, 2:55 p. m.—The French cruiser Leon Gambetta has been torpedoed by the Austrian submarine U-6 in the Strait of Otranto, the waterway leading to the Adriatic sea. Relief vessels were sent out from Brindisi, Taranto, Otranto and Bari. It has not yet been ascertained whether the attack occurred within the territorial waters of Italy. One hundred and thirty-six members of the crew were saved.

The Austrian submarine U-6 is the same craft that a few days ago boarded the Italian steamer Jalonda. Since the beginning of the Anglo-French operations against the Dardanelles, French warships in the Adriatic have limited their activities to watching the strait of Otranto with the idea of preventing any Austrian submarine escaping from the Adriatic, at the head of which is Pola, the Austrian naval base, and reaching the coast of Turkey.

The submarine which attacked the Leon Gambetta came from Cattaro, on the eastern coast of the Adriatic, 300 miles from the Greek League point. It was learned here that the U-6 was sighted by fishing boats Monday.

The French cruisers last night were watching the strait between the island of Corfu and the Italian coast. This strait when the various islands are taken into consideration does not measure more than forty or fifty miles.

It appears that the U-6 took up a position about half way between Santa Maria Leuca and the Greek League of Othoni and waited for its prey.

It is believed the Leon Gambetta had on board a crew numbering 714 men, including twenty-two officers. A majority of the men were asleep when the cruiser was struck.

From survivors' stories it is possible to construct this story of the disaster: The Leon Gambetta parted company with the French cruiser Jules Ferry last night to cross the Strait of Otranto in company with other French ships in an attempt to block the Austrian fleet if it should seek to leave the Adriatic. Although the Leon Gambetta showed no lights and adopted the other customary precautions, there was no suspicion of danger.

At midnight the warship was about twenty miles from Cape Santa Maria Leuca. At sea nothing appeared on the horizon. Suddenly there was a fearful explosion, which shook the cruiser fore and aft. Officers and men remained calm, and the survivors say their first thought was not for their own safety, but rather to detect and attack their assailant. They scanned the sea for a periscope, but in vain.

The cruiser was listing rapidly, and the commander ordered signaling for help and lowering of boats. Some of the men leaped overboard in the bare hope of saving themselves. Others were washed off the deck. The commander refused to abandon his ship. None of the survivors were able to say how long it was before help arrived.
