

BOARD MEMBERS WARNED.

Rumors at Chicago of Wilson's Assassination Put Canby on His Guard.

Chicago, May 10.—President Canby, of the Chicago Board of Trade, posted this notice today: "The officers of the Board of Trade will hold to strict accountability any member found guilty of originating or disseminating false rumors."

"All those operating leased wires are notified that will be held responsible for any false news circulated by their aid or assistance over wires."

The notice was inspired by rumors President Wilson has been assassinated. Scores of persons who called up the newspapers gave the board broken as the source of the rumors, which later grew to include other prominent men. A police investigation was started to trace the report.

SCHOOL BOARD.

Mr. G. E. Millar presented the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Whereas, in the opinion of this board it is necessary and advisable that a special election be ordered to be held in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, at which there shall be submitted the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of five (.005) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to State taxation annually for a period of ten years for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public schools of the said School District.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500.00) dollars to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said School District No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public; therefore,

Resolved, that the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, in legal session convened, as follows: Section 1. That a special election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in School District No. 11 in the parish of St. Tammany, La., on Friday, the second day of July, 1915, at which there shall be submitted the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of five (.005) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to State taxation annually for a period of ten years, for the purpose of providing additional aid to the public schools of the said school district.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500.00) dollars to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said school district No. 11 title to which shall vest in the public.

AN ORDINANCE An ordinance regulating houses of prostitution and the inmates thereof within what is commonly known as the "Restricted District" in the town of Covington. Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, in legal session convened, that the front doors of all houses of prostitution

and reconducted to read as follows: That the Town Council shall meet at least once in every month for the dispatch of business, and shall biennially choose a fit and discreet person for the office of treasurer of the town, who shall previous to entering upon the duties of his office be required to give bond in an amount to be established by the Town Council, with two securities, of whose sufficiency the Town Council shall be judge. A majority of the Town Council shall form a quorum to do business, but a majority of two-thirds of the whole council shall be necessary to pass any law or ordinance. A majority of two-thirds of the Town Council shall have power to make, in writing, any such by-law, regulation or ordinance, not contrary to the provisions of this charter or to the constitution and laws of this State, or of the United States, as they may deem necessary for the public welfare and government of the town, and specially with regard to markets, streets, highways, alleys, drains, drainage or filling, keeping in order or improving the same, with regard to owners, or in relation to the town watch and patrol. They shall have full power over all ferries, wharves and bridges, with the exception of the present bridge over the Bogue Falaya river, within their jurisdiction, and may apply the proceeds to whatever purposes they deem most necessary or proper, which has for its object the improvement of the town or its territory, and shall have full control of the entire revenue of the town, whether arising from fines, taxes or property belonging to said corporation. They shall have power to pass all ordinances and to enforce the same by fine not to exceed one hundred dollars for each offense, or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, or both, as they deem proper, for the breach of their by-laws, rules, regulations and ordinances, which fine shall be recovered before the mayor in the improvement of the town or its territory, or in the case of any corporation, viz: The town of Covington, by an attorney to be employed by the town council. The town shall have the power to impose all such taxes and licenses on trades, professions and occupations as are now or may be licensed by the State, not to exceed 100 per cent on the State license.

SECTION VI. Be it further ordained, That Section 9 of the charter of the town of Covington be amended and reconducted to read as follows: "The Mayor shall be commissioned by the Governor and shall have power to try all offenses against the laws, ordinances and regulations of the town or its officers, and to impose such fines and imprisonment as the Council may have fixed for the breach of their regulations; and all fines shall be paid into the hands of the treasurer. It shall likewise be the duty of the Mayor to preside at the meetings of the Town Council, to sign all warrants approved by the Council to draw money from the treasury; he shall sign all laws and ordinances passed by the council; and see the same carried into effect; he shall likewise sign all licenses and commissions for such subordinate offices as the council shall appoint. The Mayor and Council shall be the judges of the qualifications of their own members and shall have full power to remove from office the Mayor, or any member of the Town Council, or any officer or officers for cause, upon a vote of three-fourths of the whole number of members elected; provided, however, that neither the Mayor nor any member of the Town Council, or officer, shall be removed from office, unless upon some specific charge or charges, supported by the evidence of one or more good and credible witnesses."

SECTION VII. Be it further ordained, That Section 13 of the charter of the town of Covington be amended and reconducted to read as follows: "The Day Marshal shall be ex-officio a constable, and both Marshals shall further be subject to the supervision and control of the Town Council absolutely; and shall perform all duties as shall be prescribed to them by the Council.
