FAVORS FUND AND SUPERVISOR FOR MAINTAINING ROADS.

Covington, La., June 2, 1915. Editor St. Tammany Farmer: Dear Sir:—In your editorial of May 1st, I note that you feel the importance of maintaining the roads that are now in course of construction throughout our parish.

However, I am very much afraid that the maintaining of our roads is not being thought of as seriously as it should be. While the task of building our roads has been a big undertaking, I feel that maintaining them will be a still greater one.

S. A. A. U. MEET.

Paul A. A. was greatly handicapped, and the collegians had to rely upon their own efforts. Had they been permitted to use the same men as in 1914, Covington would again be the home of the S. A. A. U. champions, both Junior and Senior.

Cassius Richard, who had been in bed with fever up to two days before the meet, cleared the bar in the pole vault at a height of 11 feet 3 inches, getting second place to E. H. Schroter, Southern runner, who was defeated by Richard in the distance held by himself.

Nathan Tyler, by all Round World Stars. Nathan Tyler, the young blonde giant from Hammond, starred for St. Paul and incidentally was the greatest individual scorer on Junior day.

The feature of the Senior day meet was the defeat of Donald Scott, of Miss A. & M., phenomenal runner, who last year represented the St. Paul A. A., by Dana Jenkins, of the Eunice High School, in the 440 yard run. Scott had shortly before this event won the half mile run in the remarkable time of 1 minute 53 3-5 seconds, which is almost six seconds better than the previous Southern record for the distance held by himself.

Total, 16 points. He could have won two or three of the above events, but he would have been out of the star events and by his good judgment, remained a Junior until the very last event, which he won handsily, beating his nearest rival by nearly two feet.

Wallace Fassman, of Covington High. Wallace Fassman, the local high school boy, proved to the pessimists that there is just as good material around Covington High as there is anywhere.

Senior Day. Jesse Boudreaux, of St. Paul, set a new Southern record in the 16 pound shot put, with the remarkable heave of 43 feet 1 inch. This is almost three feet better than the old Southern record, which was held by Tom Dutton of the Y. M. G. C., who is six inches taller and weighs about 60 pounds more than young Boudreaux.

A little over two months ago this youngster reported to Coach Commagere of St. Paul and asked him if he would not train him for the State High School Rally. Commagere took him in hand, and a week after beginning to work out his time for the hundred yards was 11-3-5 seconds; he reported faithfully for work; learned the proper methods of getting into the right stride, etc., and developed rapidly. At the State Rally in Baton Rouge, he was barely nipped out of first place in the hundred in 10-2-5 seconds, and in the 220 yards in 24 flat. He won two second place medals in this meet.

was remarkably fast time. Senior day, notwithstanding his efforts of the previous day, he finished third in both the 100 and 220 yard dashes, beating Coleman, the Southern record holder in the 220, and a large field of star runners of much longer experience.

This proves what pertinacity of purpose and skillful training will do and also disproves the assertion that there is no athletic material in our local high schools. The material is there and only needs bringing out.

Fassman has brought glory to our home town and we are proud of him. He has won six medals in three meets and this his first year out with only two months' training.

A. U. Championships. Foster Commagere, the St. Paul Coach, who has done so much to put Covington on the map, and has turned out so many winning teams with little or no material, has been approached by the heads of the S. A. A. U. officials and we understand that he has practically been given the refusal of the 1915 Championships.

Mr. Commagere is a member of the governing board of the Southern Amateur Athletic Union, and knowing that if he handles it it will be a success next year, the committee has offered it to him, in recognition of the work he has done to uphold athletic interest in this and other sections of the country.

The games held here were pronounced the best ever pulled off in the South, and if they are held here in 1916 it will be another big boost for the progressiveness of our town.

Birmingham, Atlanta, Pensacola, Mobile and Miami, Fla., are also after the meet, but we understand Mr. Commagere has first call and that the meet will not be awarded to any other city until he has either refused or accepted it.
