Covington, La., July 3, 1915.  
The Democratic Parish Executive Committee met at the courthouse on above date.  
Present: Geo. R. Dutsch, chairman; Chas. Oulliber, by proxy to T. E. Brewster; S. D. Anderson, by proxy to E. D. Kentzel; Louis Grant-bam, H. Q. Parker, Jas. Band, Jesse Thomas, by proxy to H. Q. Parker; Dave Evans, R. Smith, by proxy to Jas. Band; T. P. Crawford, J. M. Fussell, Herman Dutsch.  
The chairman stated that the object of the meeting was to set a date for the primary election to elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention and also to fix a fee for each candidate to put up.  
It was moved and duly seconded that July 27, 1915, be the date of the first primary, and that if it becomes necessary for a second primary, that said second primary shall be held on August 10, 1915, and that each candidate running for said office shall deposit with the chairman of this committee the sum of \$15.00, on or before July 20, at 12 m.  
It was moved and duly seconded that Mr. J. M. Fussell be appointed assistant secretary of this committee, to act in the absence of the secretary.  
Carried.  
There being no further business the meeting then adjourned to meet Thursday, July 13, 1915, at which time the clerks, commissioners and deputy sheriffs of election will be appointed.

In accordance with resolution of the school board of St. Tammany parish, La., adopted April 5, 1915, the board met in regular session on the above date for the purpose of counting the vote and promulgating the returns of the special election held in the School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., on the second day of July, 1915.  
The following members were present: Geo. R. Dutsch, first ward; T. J. O'Keefe, second ward; N. H. FitzSimons, third ward; C. E. Willis, fourth ward; W. H. Kahl, fifth ward; H. Q. Parker, sixth ward; T. P. Crawford, eighth ward; C. M. Liddle, ninth ward; G. E. Millar, tenth ward. Absent: Dr. C. F. Farmer.  
Minutes of the preceding meeting were adopted as printed in the St. Tammany Farmer.  
The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Miller and seconded by Mr. Parker, and carried unanimously.  
Be it resolved, That the parish school board of the parish of St. Tammany, La., now proceed to open the ballot boxes used at the special election held in School District No. 11, on the second day of July, 1915, examine and count the votes cast at said election contained in said box in number and amounts; examine and canvass the returns made by the commissioners and clerk, serving at said election; all in accordance with a resolution of this board, ordering said election, of date April 5, 1915.  
The school board then proceeded in the presence of three competent witnesses to count the ballots contained in the box used at the said election and examine the same as to number and amounts, inspect the poll list, and compiled statements of voters made by the commissioners and clerk presiding at the said election and after such inspection an examination and the canvass of said ballots and returns were made the following resolution was introduced by Mr. Dutsch, and seconded by Mr. O'Keefe, and unanimously carried to-wit:  
Be it remembered that we the school board of St. Tammany parish, La., acting as a board of commissioners for the election held in and for the school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany on July 2, 1915, met today in regular session at the office of the parish school board in the town of Covington, La., at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of counting the votes cast at said election and examining and compiling the returns sent in by the commissioners and clerk presiding at the said election in said school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany on the second day of July, 1915, for and against the proposition submitted to the property taxpayers qualified as electors under the State of Louisiana, conformable to a resolution adopted the 5th day of April, 1915, by the parish school board of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana.  
The meeting having been regularly called to order by N. H. FitzSimons, president, and all members of said school board being present except Dr. C. F. Farmer, did, in regular open session and in the presence of H. H. Wall, Warren Thomas and Chas. W. Price, three competent witnesses, and in the presence of as many others as chose to attend the examination and inspection and compilation of the returns of said election, and having ascertained that said inspection, examination and compilation that the votes in number and amounts cast at said election held in school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., for and against the propositions submitted to the vote of the property taxpayers of said school district by a resolution of the school board of the parish of St. Tammany, adopted at a regular meeting of the board held on April 3, 1915.

**Proposition No. 1.**  
Proposition to levy a special tax of five mills on the dollar on all property in school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to State taxation annually for a period of ten years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to public schools of said district.  
For or in favor of said proposition there were cast nine (9) votes representing a taxable assessed valuation of two thousand and forty-five (\$2,045) dollars.  
Against or in opposition to said proposition there were cast no votes representing a taxable assessed valuation of nothing.  
**Proposition No. 2.**  
To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five percent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said school district No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public.  
For or in favor of said proposition No. 2 there were cast nine (9) votes, representing a taxable assessed property valuation of two thousand and forty-five (\$2,045) dollars.  
Against or in opposition to said proposition No. 2 there were cast no votes representing a taxable property assessed valuation of nothing.  
Besides the above there were cast three votes which clearly were intended to have been cast in favor of both proposition Nos. 1 and 2, but through technical reasons we have counted them as spoiled ballots.  
And after counting the votes, inspected and examined the same as to numbers and amounts and having inspected and examined and canvassed the poll list, the tally sheets, and compiled statement of voters made by the commissioners and clerk presiding at said election, and compiling the returns of said election, we replaced in the ballot box, the tickets or ballots, the poll list, tally sheet and compiled statement of voters cast at said election and after having sealed same and deposited said box with the secretary of the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, La., and having satisfied ourselves that the returns as above set forth are true and correct, and that the proposition submitted to the taxpayers qualified as electors under the law and the constitution of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election held in school district No. 11 of St. Tammany parish, La., on July 2, 1915, was carried by a majority vote in number and amount of the assessed valuation of the property taxpayers voting at the said election; we, the parish school board of the parish of St. Tammany, La., acting as commissioners of the aforesaid election held in school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., in open session assembled as aforesaid, hereby declare that the said propositions submitted to the property taxpayers of the school district No. 11, by resolution of the school board of the parish of St. Tammany, adopted on the 5th day of April, 1915, as aforesaid, are carried as evidenced by the compilation of the votes as hereinabove set forth; and having made public proclamation of the above results, we have closed this process verbal of the compilation of the votes cast at the aforesaid election, in number and amount, which is made in triplicate, one copy of which the secretary is ordered to file with the secretary of the State of Louisiana, another with the clerk of St. Tammany Court of the parish of St. Tammany, La., and a third copy to deposit in the archives of the office of the school board of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana.  
In evidence whereof the president of the said board and the members thereof have signed this process verbal on this 3d day of July, 1915, in open session, held at the office of the school board at Covington, La.

**AN ORDINANCE**  
Providing for the issuance and sale of school bonds of School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars.  
Whereas, at a special election duly and regularly held in school district No. 11, of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on the second day of July, 1915, in conformity to a resolution of the parish board of school directors, there was submitted to the vote of the property taxpayers entitled to vote in said school district No. 11, a proposition to incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars, to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said school district No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public; and  
Whereas, the incurring of said debt and the issuance of said bonds for said purpose was duly authorized by the vote of a majority in both number and amounts of votes cast at said election; and  
Whereas, said debt has not been incurred or said bonds issued;  
Section 1. Be it resolved by the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, La., that the president and secretary of this board be and they are hereby authorized and directed to have prepared and to execute in the name of the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, La., for and on behalf of school district No. 11 of said parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, five (5) negotiable bonds numbered from one to five, both numbers inclusive; and in denomination of five hundred (\$500) dollars each, bearing date of September 1, 1915, and being due and payable as follows, to-wit:  
No. 1, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1918.  
No. 2, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1917.  
No. 3, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1918.  
No. 4, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1918.  
No. 5, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1920.  
All of said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of March and September of each and every year until the principal and interest, to be payable at the office of the secretary of the parish board of school directors in the town of Covington, Louisiana, and said bonds shall be

St. Tammany parish, in the presence known as School District No. 11 Bonds.  
The interest of said bonds shall be evidenced by proper coupons attached to each bond and both the principal and interest of said bonds shall be due and payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness. Said bonds shall be signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this board.  
Section 2. Be it further resolved, etc., that all of said bonds and all of said interest coupons attached thereto shall be in substantially the following forms, respectively:

School District No. 11 Bonds of the Parish Board of School Directors  
Know all men by these presents, That the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, acknowledge itself to be indebted and for value received hereby promises to pay to bearer the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars on the first day of September, 19... together with interest thereon from date hereof until paid at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of September and March of each year until final payment hereof on the presentation and surrender of his bond and the interest coupons attached as they severally become due.  
Both principal and interest of this bond are due and payable at the office of the secretary of the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, in the town of Covington, State of Louisiana, in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness.  
This bond is one of a series of five (5) bonds of like tenor, date and amount, issued for the purpose of providing funds to construct and equip a public school building in school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in full conformity to Article 281 of the Constitution of Louisiana, and the statutes for carrying same into effect, and is authorized and directed by a vote of the majority in both number and amount of the property taxpayers called and held in and for said school district No. 11 as provided by the constitution and statutes of Louisiana.  
It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by the constitution and statutes of the State of Louisiana precedent to and necessary in issuing this bond have been regularly done and performed; that the total indebtedness of said parish board of school directors and on behalf of said school district No. 11 does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation; and that full ample provision has been made for the collection of a direct property tax on all property subject to State taxation within the limits of said school district No. 11, annually for a period of five years beginning with the year 1915, sufficient to pay the interest and principal of this issue of bonds as the same mature and for the prompt payment thereof, in both principal and interest, the full faith, credit and resources of the said school district No. 11 are irrevocably pledged.
