Pellegrini was then living with his first wife at 1115 Gallatin street, near the French Market. The woman and the children still live there. Young Girl Disappears From Her Home.

Police circles were advised one morning that Ida St. Ann had disappeared from her parents' home. A two-day search was made for her and she was finally found in a rooming house. Girl and man were arrested. He was released and she sent to the House of the Good Shepherd. Then Pellegrini and his wife were divorced, and when Ida St. Ann was released from the Good Shepherd home Pellegrini married her.

In the oblivious happiness of his second marriage, Pellegrini forgot all about Mrs. Pellegrini No. 1 and the three children—Victor 10, Anthony 9, and Rosa 7. The mother was forced to return to a shoe factory where she had worked before her marriage to struggle to support the children. She asked the juvenile court to make her divorced husband contribute to the support of his children and Pellegrini was ruled in for non-support.

Pellegrini furnished bond and vanished. It was learned that he was living in Abita Springs and his bondsman surrendered him. Detective Porretto went to Abita Springs Sunday to bring Pellegrini back to New Orleans. While being held in the town jail awaiting to be returned to New Orleans Mrs. Pellegrini No. 3 stormed the Abita prison and forced the warden to let her remain with her husband. But he was brought to town alone.

Monday in the juvenile court Mrs. Pellegrini No. 1 mysteriously withdrew her charges. She said that her divorced husband had been giving her money for the past two weeks and she didn't want him prosecuted. She was with him at the Terminal Station when he went back to Abita Springs Monday evening, and it is said that she was begging him to return to her and forsake the second wife. She denies this, however.

Pellegrini went back to Abita and Mrs. Pellegrini No. 2, nine-year-old Anthony, the son of the first wife, has been living with him and the second Mrs. Pellegrini in Abita. It is said that the child is suffering with tuberculosis and the father has been caring for him in Abita, in hopes that he would recover.
