At about three o'clock a. m., Monday, June 28, 1915, Wm. Whittia, a private watchman, while making his rounds in vicinity of Third and Freret streets, New Orleans, noticed a black smoke issuing from the two-story frame building in rear of 2601-03 Freret, corner Third, and immediately thereafter saw flames shoot from windows on second floor. Whittia, on going to corner, saw occupants, Jack and Kildine, on sidewalk fully dressed. He heard no outcry of fire from them previous to his discovering same. Alarm was sent in, Fire Department responded, and after fire was extinguished oil and other inflammables were found set up in different parts of the building. A representative of the Fire Marshal was notified and upon his arrival an inspection was made and the following conditions found to exist: In each corner of the second floor of the two-story rear building was found a barrel containing kerosene and kerosene and the remains of a 5-gallon demijohn which had contained oil, and in center of floor was found a 5-gallon jacket containing turpentine, strewn about the floor was found wrapping paper saturated with oil and turpentine. On the first or ground floor in a locker beneath stairway was found a 5-gallon can that had contained oil and 5-gallon demijohn filled with oil. Paper and kindling wood saturated with oil was also found in the locker. In the southwest corner of the building beneath all of old lumber, doors, etc., was a 5-gallon demijohn containing oil, with paper and trash accumulations all about. In rear room southeast corner of ground floor was found remains of wooden box and demijohn showing evidence of being contained oil. Wrapping paper similar to that found on second floor was found saturated with oil and strewn all about this floor. In the double one-story building fronting Freret Street
