HEALTH ORDINANCE NO. 12. 1. Be it ordained by the Municipal Board of Health of the town of Covington, that any person who shall bring or cause to be brought from any of the country surrounding the corporate limits of this town any animal suffering or infected with charbon shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

2. To be further ordained, that no animal infected with charbon shall be permitted to remain within the corporate limits of the town for any purpose whatsoever, and any animal so infected or suffering from charbon as allowed to remain, after notice by this Board to the owner or his representative, shall be liable to immediate destruction and disposal under the directions of this board.

3. Be it further ordained, that any person violating or interfering with the execution of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to pay a fine in the sum of not more than \$25, or to be imprisoned for a time not more than 30 days, or both, at the pleasure of the court.
