AN ORDINANCE Providing for the issuance and sale of school bonds of School District No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, La., to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars.

Whereas, at a special election duly and regularly held in school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on the second day of July, 1915, in conformity to a resolution of this board ordering said election, there was submitted to the vote of the property taxpayers entitled to vote in said school district No. 11, a proposition to incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars, to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a public school building within said school district No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public; and

Whereas, the incurring of said debt and the issuance of said bonds for said purpose was duly authorized by the vote of a majority in both number and amounts of votes cast at said election; and

Whereas, said debt has not been incurred or said bonds issued.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, La., that the president and secretary of this board be and they are hereby authorized to execute in the name of the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, La., for and on behalf of school district No. 11 of said parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, five (5) negotiable bonds numbered from one to five, both numbers inclusive, and in denomination of five hundred (\$500) dollars each, bearing date of September 1, 1915, and being due and payable as follows, to-wit:

No. 1, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1916.

No. 2, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1917.

No. 3, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1918.

No. 4, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1919.

No. 5, aggregating \$500 on September 1, 1920.

All of said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of March and September of each and every year until the payment of the principal sum thereof, both principal and interest, to be payable at the office of the secretary of the parish board of school directors in the town of Covington, Louisiana, and said bonds shall be known as School District No. 11 Bonds.

The interest of said bonds shall be evidenced by proper coupons attached to each bond and both the principal and interest of said bonds shall be due and payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness. Said bonds shall be signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this board.

Section 2. Be it further resolved, etc., that all of said bonds and all of said interest coupons attached thereto shall be in substantially the following forms, respectively:

United States of America State of Louisiana Parish of St. Tammany. No. \$500.00 School District No. 11 Bonds of the Parish Board of School Directors

Know all men by these presents, That the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, acknowledges itself to be indebted and for value received hereby promises to pay to bearer the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars on the first day of September, 19... together with interest thereon from date hereof until paid at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of September and March of each year until final payment hereof on the presentation and surrender of his bond and the interest coupons attached to which severally become due.

Both principal and interest of this bond are due and payable at the office of the secretary of the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany in the town of Covington, State of Louisiana, in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness.

This bond is one of a series of five (5) bonds of like tenor, date and amount, issued for the purpose of providing funds to construct and equip a public school building in school district No. 11 of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana.

and in full conformity to Article 281 of the Constitution of Louisiana, and the statutes for carrying same into effect, and is authorized and directed by a vote of the majority in both number and amount of the property taxpayers called and held in said school district No. 11 as provided by the constitution and statutes of Louisiana.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by the constitution and statutes of the State of Louisiana precedent to and necessary in issuing this bond have been regularly done and performed; that the total indebtedness of said parish board of school directors and behalf of said school district No. 11 does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation; and that full ample provision has been made for the collection of a direct property tax on all property subject to State taxation within the limits of said school district No. 11, annually, for a period of five years beginning with the year 1915, sufficient to pay the interest and principal of the issue of bonds of the same nature and for the prompt payment thereof, in both principal and interest, the full faith, credit and resources of the said school district No. 11 are irrevocably pledged.

In testimony whereof the said parish school board of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, has caused this bond to be signed by its president and attested by its secretary.

No. \$12.50 On September 1, 19... and on March 1, 19... the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, will pay to bearer twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars, at the office of the secretary of the parish board of school directors of the parish of St. Tammany, in the town of Covington, State of Louisiana, being six months interest due on its school district No. 11 bond No. ...., dated September 1, 1915.

Section 3. Be it further resolved, etc., that the proceeds of the sale of the bonds herein authorized and directed to be issued shall be devoted exclusively to the constructing and furnishing a public school building in district No. 11, title to which shall vest in the public.

Section 4. Be it further resolved, etc., that this board do and it is hereby bound itself irrevocably and contractually to and with any purchaser or purchasers of said bonds that it, and its successors in office will annually during the life of said bonds at the same time that other taxes are levied in addition to all other taxes now authorized by the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana levy a special tax upon all taxable property in said school district No. 11 subject to State taxation sufficient to pay the interest and principal on said bonds becoming due the ensuing year; that it will enforce the collection of said special tax annually as the same becomes due and exigible; provided that said tax shall cease to be levied immediately on the retirement of all bonds which may be issued and the payment of which the principal on said bonds herein authorized to be issued and the proceeds of said tax to be solicited shall be sacredly devoted and applied to the payment of the principal and interest as the same shall become due.

have power and authority to make all necessary rules and regulations for the management, operation and control of the business of the corporation, as well as to make all necessary rules and by-laws, with power to fill any vacancy occurring in their number. A majority of directors voting at any one time, in person or by proxy, shall be required to pass any resolution or adopt any by-law; and which, when so adopted, shall become valid corporate acts.

ARTICLE VI. Notice of all meetings of stockholders for electing directors or for any other purpose, shall be given in writing by the secretary, to be deposited in the mail at least fifteen days before such meeting, directed to each stockholder at his last known address appearing upon the books of the corporation, unless said notice is waived in writing by all the stockholders appearing as such upon the books.

ARTICLE VII. This act of incorporation may be modified, added to, changed or amended or this corporation may be dissolved by and with the consent of the holders of two-thirds in amount of the then outstanding stock given at a general meeting of the stockholders, to be convened after fifteen days prior notice, as provided in Article VI of this charter.

In the event of the dissolution of said corporation, either by limitation of its charter, or otherwise, its affairs shall be liquidated by three commissioners, to be appointed and elected at a special meeting of the stockholders for that purpose, as above provided, and who shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall be fully liquidated; and in the event of the death or disability of one or more of said liquidators, the survivor or survivors shall continue to act.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder shall be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to liability beyond the amount of his unpaid stock, if any.
