GREAT CROWD ATTENDS THE BECKER FUNERAL.

"Sacrificed to Politics" in the Legend on the Largest Floral Tribute Presented.

New York, Aug. 2.—The funeral of Charles Becker was held today from the Church of St. Nicholas of Tolentine in the Bronx. The church was filled and the overflow stood in the street. So great was the crowd that police reserves had to be called. Carriages to take part in the funeral procession extended several blocks. One carriage was filled with floral tributes. The largest was a floral cross, bearing the inscription, "Sacrificed to Politics." A card conveyed the information that it had come "From a friend."

Before the body was taken to the church, friends of the former police lieutenant gathered at the Becker home to view the body. Police reserves formed them into a line that stretched for half a mile. Those who saw the casket noticed that it bore a new plate, reading "Charles Becker. Died July 30, 1915." A plate removed by the police yesterday bore the allegation that Becker was "murdered by Governor Whitman."

In the crowd that passed in and out of the Becker house were policemen of all ranks. They were nearly all in civilian clothes. As the casket was being removed the crowd pushed in and the police had difficulty in keeping the way clear. A wreath alongside the floral cross had the words "To the martyr—with sincere sympathy" on it. Less than a dozen carriages followed the hearse to Woodlawn Cemetery. As the carriage filled with the floral offerings was about to drive through the gates, uniformed employes removed the "Sacrificed to Politics" inscription from the floral cross. Hundreds crowded around the grave as the casket was being lowered.

ORIHAKAUA REPORTS VILLA IN DEFIANT MOOD.

Confiscation Stores of Foreign Merchants—Says America Can "Go to Hell."

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 3.—"The American government can go to hell!" declared General Francisco Villa, addressing a gathering of foreign merchants at Chihuahua City Saturday, according to reports brought here today. Shortly afterward, the report says, he confiscated a number of their stores. Forty-two Mexican merchants were jailed after the confiscation of a forced loan. Six were executed, it is said.

General Villa stamped up and down the room where the foreign and Mexican business men were assembled and shook his fist in their faces. "I am going to take your business for the benefit of the state," he declared. "Your employes will remain here and conduct the business under the direction of my agents—you have been stealing from the people for yourselves."

"Tomorrow at noon a train will be ready to take you foreigners to the border. You are here and I will not send bread or water on the train. Meanwhile you Americans and Germans and Frenchmen, my telegraph wires will be open to you and you can protest to your governments."

"If the American government doesn't like my action it can go to hell. I have been fighting for 20 years and I am willing to fight as many years more."

The trade ended it was said with a general order for the confiscation of all stores. Among the foreign firms affected is the general supply store of Ketselsen & Degatua, the hardware business of Krakauer, Zork & Mayo, the jewelry store of F. H. Booth, the merchandise store of L. W. Thompson, the dry goods house of Wm. Hanzow and half a dozen others.

The trains that was to carry the expelled merchants to the border had not arrived up to noon today.

Among the plants taken over is the Jabonera Cotton Seed Products Company, said to be a British corporation, representing an investment of about \$5,000,000.

A general meeting of the merchants with General Villa was called for yesterday, in the hope of securing a modification of the confiscation. The result has not reached the border.

CHARTER of SCHOEN & MOLLOY, INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Before me, Adrian Daniel Schwartz, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for this parish and state, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons who are hereto subscribed, residents of this State, who severally declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of the Legislature of this State known as Act 247 of 1914, they do by these presents agree and bind themselves, as well as all such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them in order to form and constitute a corporation for the objects and purposes hereinafter set forth, and under the following conditions, to-wit:

The name and title of this corporation shall be Schoen & Molloy, Inc., and it shall have legal succession for ninety-nine years from date hereof and shall enjoy all rights, privileges and immunities guaranteed to corporations under the laws of this State.

The domicile of this corporation shall be in Covington, La., where all citation and other legal processes shall be served upon the vice president and general manager, or in his absence upon those officers designated by law.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business carried on by it are hereby declared to be a general livery, garage, embalming and funeral undertaking business; to acquire by purchase or otherwise all manner of real or personal property and the same to mortgage, pledge or lease according to law and so to do all things incident to the purpose aforesaid.

The capital stock of this corporation is hereby declared to be fixed at the sum of five thousand (\$5000) dollars, divided into fifty shares of the par value of one hundred (\$100) dollars each, and this corporation shall be operative and go into business when fifty per cent of the said amount shall have been subscribed and paid for. No transfer of stock shall be binding upon this corporation unless same appears upon the books thereof. No stockholder shall have the right to assign or transfer any share or shares held by him unless he shall have first tendered same in writing to the Board of Directors.

The corporate power of this corporation shall be vested in a board of three directors to be elected by the stockholders to be held on the first Saturday of July, in each year. HEALTH ORDINANCE NO. 12.

1. Be it ordained by the Municipal Board of Health of the town of Covington, That any person who shall bring or cause to be brought from any of the country surrounding the corporate limits of this town any animal suffering or infected with charbon shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

2. To be further ordained that no animal infected with charbon shall be permitted to remain within the corporate limits of the town for any purpose whatsoever, and any animal so infected or suffering from charbon so allowed to remain, after notice by this Board to the owner or his representative, shall be liable to immediate destruction and disposal under the directions of this board.

3. Be it further ordained, That any person violating or interfering with the execution of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to pay a fine in the sum of and not more than \$25, or to be imprisoned for a time not more than 30 days, or both, at the pleasure of the Board.

ACT OF INCORPORATION of LES COQUILLES COMPANY, INCORPORATED.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans.

Be it known that on this the 1st day of the month of July, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and fifteen, and of the independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty-ninth.

Before me, Charles F. Fletchinger, a Notary Public duly commissioned and qualified in and for the State, parish and city aforesaid, therein residing, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that, availing themselves of the laws of this State relative to the formation and organization of corporations, they have covenanted and agreed, and do, by these presents, covenant, agree and bind themselves, as well as those who may hereafter become associated with them, to form themselves into a corporation for the objects and purposes with the name and under the stipulation following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and style of this corporation shall be "Les Coquilles Company, Incorporated," and by said corporate name it shall have succession and enjoy existence for a period of ninety-nine years, unless sooner dissolved in the manner provided by law and the articles of this charter; and under said corporate name it shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, the same to alter or break at pleasure, to make all necessary rules and regulations for its corporate management and control, and shall have and enjoy all the rights, privileges and immunities which are now conferred upon, or may hereafter be granted to corporations of the same kind and character.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation shall be the island known as Les Coquilles Island in the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and all citations and other legal processes shall be served upon the president, or, in his absence or inability to act, upon any other officer of the corporation.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be to buy, sell, own, lease, cultivate or otherwise use or deal in lands in the State of Louisiana and elsewhere; to buy, sell, lease, breed or otherwise handle or deal in cattle or other animals; to own, lease or operate canning factories or other manufacturing business; to import or export or otherwise handle or deal in agricultural products or other merchandise; to own, charter or otherwise acquire or operate vessels of any character for the purpose of shipping or transporting products or merchandise dealt in by the corporation, or otherwise; and to procure insurance on such vessels or merchandise for its own account or for others; to own stock in any other corporation or organization, and to have such general and individual powers as may be necessary in furtherance of the objects and purposes herein set forth or such as a natural person might have or exercise, and to have and be vested with such powers as are conferred upon corporations of the same kind and character, under the laws of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE IV. The authorized capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars, represented by five hundred (500) shares of the par value of one hundred (\$100) dollars each, to be paid at such time and in such manner as the board of directors may require and may be issued for cash or in payment for property or services actually received by or rendered to said corporation.

This corporation shall become a going concern as soon as fifty thousand dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed for and paid. The parties hereto declare that they hereby subscribe for the number of shares set opposite their respective signatures hereto, or an aggregate of \$50,000.

The capital stock of this corporation may be increased to the sum of \$150,000 in accordance with the provisions of the law pertaining thereto.

ARTICLE V. All the powers of this corporation shall be vested in and be exercised by a board of not less than three nor more than five directors, to be elected at the stockholder's meeting. The persons so named as directors, all of whom shall be bona fide stockholders, may elect from their own number a president, a vice president and a secretary-treasurer. The first board of directors, with postoffice addresses are as follows: A. D. Geoghegan, Hennen Building, New Orleans, La., president. Charles Monsted, Hennen Building, New Orleans, La., vice president. Oscar Reeh, Hennen Building, New Orleans, La., secretary-treasurer.

On the second Tuesday of January, 1917, and on the same day of each succeeding year, except when such day shall fall on a legal holiday, then upon the next following day, the stockholders shall elect a board of directors for the ensuing year; the board already installed to continue to hold over until their successors are elected and qualified.

The board of directors so elected shall select from their own number the officers of the corporation as above provided, and may also appoint a manager of the corporation. The election of directors shall be by ballot, and the persons receiving the largest number of votes cast shall be declared elected. For electing directors or for any other purpose, each share of stock, whether present or by proxy, shall be entitled to one vote, and a majority of votes cast shall be required to pass any resolution or decide any question submitted to the stockholders, except for the alteration or amendment of this charter or the dissolution of the corporation, as hereinafter provided.

have power and authority to make all necessary rules and regulations for the management, operation and control of the business of the corporation, as well as to make all necessary rules and by-laws, with power to fill any vacancy occurring in their number. A majority of directors voting at any one time, in person or by proxy, shall be required to pass any resolution or adopt any by-law, and which, when so adopted, shall become valid corporate acts.

ARTICLE VI. Notice of all meetings of stockholders for electing directors or for any other purpose, shall be given in writing by the secretary, to be deposited in the mail at least fifteen days before such meeting, directed to each stockholder at his last known address appearing upon the books of the corporation, unless said notice is waived in writing by all the stockholders appearing as such upon the books.

ARTICLE VII. This act of incorporation may be modified, added to, changed or amended or this corporation may be dissolved by and with the consent of the holders of two-thirds (2/3) of the then outstanding stock given at a general meeting of the stockholders, to be convened after fifteen days prior notice, as provided in Article VI of this charter.

In the event of the dissolution of said corporation, either by limitation of its charter, or otherwise, its affairs shall be liquidated by three commissioners, to be appointed and elected at a special meeting of the stockholders for that purpose, as above provided, and who shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall be fully liquidated; and in the event of the death or disability of one or more of said liquidators, the survivor or survivors shall continue to act.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder shall be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any more informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to liability beyond the amount of his unpaid stock, if any.
