And that the secretary be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, lists of voters and compiled statement of votes in number and amount.

Sec. 3. That the polling place of said election shall be the usual polling place in the First ward of St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, and the following commissioners and clerk are appointed: Homer Perrin, Benj. Gallasan and Christian Koepf, sr. commissioners, and Paul A. Blanchard, clerk, to serve at said polling place at said election, all of whom shall serve without compensation, and said election shall be conducted under the laws of the State of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Sec. 4. The president of this board is hereby authorized to give notice of the special election herein ordered, by his proclamation to be published according to law, and to said proclamation he shall announce that at 10:00 o'clock a. m., on the 7th day of October, 1915, this board will meet at its usual meeting place in Covington, Louisiana, and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election.

The following bids were received for the contract to furnish team and driver to run the school wagon from Blackwell's mill to Folsom school in the Second ward.

J. W. Blackwell, \$34.90. J. E. Blackwell and J. P. Tyner, \$45.00.

Moved by Mr. Dutsch and seconded by Mr. Parker that the contract for furnishing team and driver to run the school transfer wagon to the Folsom school from Blackwell's mill be given to J. W. Blackwell at his bid of \$34.90 a school month, and he to furnish a bond through a bonding company for the amount of \$300. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Parker that the bids for operating the school wagons in the First ward of the Mandeville school be opened at the October meeting, at which time the board would receive bids for the furnishing team and driver and the board a wagon, the same as in Second and Fifth wards. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dutsch and seconded by Dr. F. Farmer that:

Whereas, the contractor for painting the Sun school has not given bond through a bonding company as requested, that the board rescind a former vote granting this contract to Mr. E. A. Peters, and authorize the superintendent to re-advertise for bids for the painting of said school, asking for a deposit of 10 per cent of bids for liquidated damages, should the successful bidder fail to give bond as required. Carried.

Dr. R. B. Payne and others, representing the trustees of the Mandeville public school, appeared before the board and presented the following petition:

Mandeville, La., Aug. 5, 1915. To the Hon. School Board, Covington, La.

The petition of the undersigned, the local trustees of Mandeville public school, with respect, represents:

That a large proportion of the children of Mandeville who had to attend the high school at Covington failed to make their grades. On inquiry into the cause of these failures, we have been informed that poor ground work in the Mandeville public school is responsible.

Inasmuch as we always have some teachers here who hold only second or third grade certificates, and poor ground work is assigned as the cause of our children's failures, we therefore petition your honorable body, not to allow the appointment of any teachers for the Mandeville public school except such as are properly qualified and hold first grade certificates, hoping that in the future we may by this means by spared the humiliation of having our children fail to be promoted when they go to the high school.

This is all the more important when you consider the great inconvenience, trouble and extra expense that is imposed upon the parents here, on account of the early hour of departure and late hour of returning on the motor cars, and the lack of some responsible grown person to accompany the children on these trips. It is too much of a sacrifice and there are too many attending dangers for our children to be denied anything that will insure them a proper foundation for the high school.

Our petition further represents that the idea of having a principal for this school and allowing this principal to teach in a district school is a delusion and is altogether impracticable, and has been proved to be absolutely detrimental to the best interests of the school.

We therefore petition your honorable body to see that we have a principal appointed for this school who can be here at all hours every day.

Our petition further represents that a great and serious injustice is done to the children of this the Fourth ward, because they are denied the benefits of a full nine months' session, when the statistics will show that the revenues to which this ward is justly entitled are sufficient to run our schools for nine months and have a nice little surplus besides. Having ample funds for our requirements, and already paying 2 1/2 mills taxes in the town, we do not think it right or necessary

to have a special school tax. We do not question the legal right of your honorable body to pool the funds of the entire parish as is now done, but we do claim that it is an injustice to some of the children of the parish, inasmuch as the present method prevent all of them from getting a full session, which some could realize under a different method. We therefore petition your honorable body to allow to each ward the distribution of its own funds, and to this end we desire our director, the Hon. C. B. Willis, to exert every effort to convince you that it is just and equitable to everybody concerned and to the best interests of the parish public school system.

Moved by Dr. Farmer and seconded by Mr. Kahl that the petition be received and made a part of the records of the meeting. Carried.

At this time Mr. C. B. Willis, school director from the Fourth ward, made a strong plea to the board to change the method of distributing the general school funds so that the money should hereafter go to the various wards in proportion to the amount pooled by the same wards, instead of pooling the funds and giving each ward the same length of schools.

After being shown that if the proposed change be made, some wards would get three months of school as many mills for school tax as those wards do that would get nine months, he very graciously withdrew his request. In doing so he stated that if it was a question of the greater good to the greater number that decided the method of division, he was satisfied to have the same method of distribution continue.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Dr. Farmer that the chair appoint a committee to wait upon the management of the St. Tammany & New Orleans Railway & Ferry Co. and to bring out a better schedule for a car to bring the school children to the Covington school. Carried.

The president appointed Messrs. Millar and Willis.

At this time the superintendent asked permission to make a statement regarding the reference in the petition from Mandeville concerning the Mandeville school teaching in Covington.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Parker that the following verbal report of the superintendent be written on and made a part of the records of the school board. It is in substance, as follows:

"Schools for the year 1914-15 began with four teachers in the Mandeville school. The principal taught the eighth and ninth grades and had eleven pupils attending in those grades, for which he was receiving \$75.00 a month.

"When Mr. John M. Foote, assistant rural school inspector, visited this school with me, he found Mr. Smith, the principal, trying to do high school work. This was impossible, because he could not give 40-minute recitation periods, as the state board requires, could not teach any of the sciences, such as botany, physiology, zoology, physics, or chemistry, and even history, in such a way as the State department would be able to accept and give credits for; no would any college in the land, of standing, be willing to give credit for. In other words he thought that the time spent by the pupils in these grades was about lost because the grades would have to be taken over again should the pupils desire to graduate. From any high school they could not do these things because the Mandeville school is not equipped with the necessary laboratories and library for research work.

"Because of the above conditions just outlined, Mr. Foote recommended that the high school pupils of the Mandeville and Abita schools be given permission to come to Covington High School, where they would be given access to the laboratory facilities. This change was made and later this school board gave its approval to this change.

"Not just as soon as the eighth and ninth grades were taken from the Mandeville school we had taken the work from the principal, unless we gave him some of the grammar grades and he objected to doing that grade of work. Besides if he had not, we would have been giving more teachers for the Mandeville pupils than we are giving for the same number of pupils in any other school.

"Mr. Smith was given work in the Covington school and the next teaching Mandeville was offered the principalship, but she rejected it unless her salary was given a large increase. This I was not able to give because the money had all been appropriated and the appropriation was in excess of the income. Besides all this I most positively feel that her work was not increased \$5.00 a month. Each teacher had charge of the discipline of her own room, and this teacher, if she had been appointed principal, could not have visited other rooms for supervision at all, as she had classes to teach every period. It would have been giving her an increase in salary because she had consented to wear a title of principal.

"I have explained these facts to both the representatives from the Fourth ward present and to the ward director. I have told them that for the coming year I had no idea of not giving Mandeville a principal and I resent the suggestion that the nature of this petition you have listened to.

"I realize that the parents might like to have the children attend school in Mandeville and I wish there was a high school in that town, but as there is not and because of the fact that they can get one to attend for the small amount of five cents a day, I feel it my duty and your duty as school board to require this arrangement. I have not taken into consideration anything but the welfare of the children, and I believe when we begin to consider another thing we are putting stumbling blocks in the way of school progress. The idea with me is schools are run only for the benefit of the pupil, and not for the parents' sake.

"As far as I am personally concerned, it will not affect me in this arrangement of having the Mandeville and Abita children come to our high school, is not continued. Still I feel that it will be an injustice to

the children if it is not. I know of no way that the high school pupils of these schools can get high school advantages for the small sum of five cents a day. I believe that this small item of five cents a day is a small one when it comes to the matter of a child's education."

Mr. Millar asked if it was true that the Mandeville people did not want to come to Covington and Mr. Willis, ward director, stated that there was no other way that the Mandeville children could be given a high school education except by the way that the petitioners complained of.

Moved by Mr. Dutsch and seconded by Mr. Parker that a new school house be built for the Ridge school in the Eighth ward. Carried.

The president appointed T. P. Crawford, E. A. Daws, Joe Provoost, Tom McQueen and the superintendent to act as building committee and have in charge selection of site and building house. Carried.

Moved by Dr. Farmer and seconded by Mr. Parker that ward director of the Eight ward and the president and superintendent be a committee empowered to advertise for bids to paint the Robert school and award the contract, etc. Carried.

Moved by Dr. Farmer and seconded by Mr. Dutsch that the superintendent be given a leave of absence of three weeks, commencing September 8 and ending September 30. Carried.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Dutsch, who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Dr. Farmer:

Whereas, the State Department of Education has for the past three years been conducting a summer school in the Florida Parishes, and Whereas, this school has been held at Amite, Hammond and Franklin ton, and

Whereas, we believe that this parish is justly entitled to the honor of having it held within its limits therefore be it

Resolved, that we, the School Board of St. Tammany Parish, in legal session convened, do most cordially invite the state superintendent and institute conductor and others in authority to hold its summer school for the Florida Parishes at Covington, La., during the summer of 1915.

Resolved, that the superintendent is authorized to send a copy of these resolutions to the State superintendent and institute conductor.

Adopted.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Parker that the District No. 11 school bonds be sold to the Covington Bank & Trust Co. for par value and that the board pay them \$50.00 for lithographing the bonds and necessary attorney expenses. Carried.

Mr. Warren Sharp of the Second ward appeared before the board and asked for assistance in getting his children and those of his neighbors to the Middle Roads school. Upon motion by Mr. Dutsch and seconded by Mr. Millar this matter was voted to be laid over until the October meeting.

Moved by Mr. Millar and seconded by Mr. Willis that the St. Tammany Farmer be appointed as the official journal of the school board for the yearling year at \$100 a year. Carried.

The following resolutions was introduced by Mr. Liddle, who moved its adoption. It was seconded by Mr. Dutsch.

Whereas, the Board of School Directors find there will not be sufficient money with which to defray the expenses of public school affairs, and

Whereas, the need is urgent for additional revenue for a constantly increasing care of public school children, therefore be it

Resolved, this Board of School Directors does now respectfully petition the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish to order a tax levy of four mills for public school purposes, instead of three mills, as now, and be signing in the year 1915.

Be it further resolved, that the president and secretary of this board be authorized to appear, with as board, as possible, before the Police Jury, to present this resolution, and many other members of this board urge the granting of additional aid to the public schools of St. Tammany Parish.

On motion duly seconded it was voted to adjourn, subject to call.
