

AMENDMENT to Charter of SHIDELL DRY DOCK AND SHIPBUILDING COMPANY.

Be it known that on this 16th day of September, 1915, before me, Benjamin M. Miller, a Notary Public within and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally came and appeared F. W. Salmen and E. F. Halley, residents of said parish, to me personally known, who declared that the said F. W. Salmen was chairman, and the said E. F. Halley was the secretary of a meeting of the stockholders of the Shidell Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Company, in Shidell, Louisiana, on the 16th day of September, 1915, and that all of the stockholders of said corporation were present at said meeting, in person or by written proxy.

And said appellants declared that at such meeting of said stockholders a resolution was adopted by the unanimous vote of all the stockholders that Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation of said corporation should be amended, and said Article IV was duly amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to be divided into and represented by Fifty (50) shares of stock of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each. Said stock to be paid for in cash at such time and in such amounts, and after such notices to the subscribers, as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, or the same may be issued at not less than par for labor done or money or property actually received or purchased by the said corporation.

Said corporation to become a going concern and to be authorized to do business as soon as fifty per cent of such capital stock has been subscribed and one-half of such subscription has been actually paid in. All transfers of stock must be made upon the books of the corporation by surrender of the original certificate properly endorsed for cancellation by the stockholder in whose favor such stock certificate is issued or by his duly authorized agent, and upon receipt of said certificate, the secretary shall be authorized to cancel same and issue a new certificate in lieu thereof.

After the said capital stock of Five Thousand Dollars shall have been issued, no holder of any of said stock, without the consent of the Board of Directors expressed by formal resolution to that effect, shall sell or dispose of the same to any person not a stockholder in the company, until he shall have offered said stock for sale at the price bona fide offered to him by any non-stockholder, to the Board of Directors of the company, who shall have the right to buy said stock at such offered price, for the benefit of the other stockholders in the company, and to distribute the same pro rata among such stockholders. This clause shall be expressed on the face of every certificate of stock, and the officers of the company shall have no power to transfer on the books of the company any stock disposed of in violation of this provision of the charter.

In case of any increase of the capital stock of the stockholders of record at the time of such increase shall have the preferential right to subscribe at par for any such increase, pro rata to their respective holdings; and that those appearing were authorized and instructed by said stockholders' meeting to execute the proper notarial act amending the charter of said corporation in accordance with the said vote of said stockholders.

And said appellants thereupon declared that the Articles of Incorporation of said Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Company have been duly and legally amended by the vote of the stockholders of said corporation, and they make this declaration and execute this notarial act in accordance therewith.

Thus done and signed at my office in Shidell, Louisiana, in the presence of G. V. Wharton and D. Carpenter, who sign the same with said appellants and me, Notary, after reading of the whole.

ORDINANCE NO. 250. An ordinance prohibiting prostitution, maintenance of houses of prostitution, prohibiting women and girls from frequenting barrooms and drinking therein, and providing a penalty therefor, and repealing an ordinance adopted by the town council of the town of Covington, La., on October 6th, 1914, relative to what was known as the Restricted District.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the town council of the town of Covington, Louisiana, in legal session convened, that it shall be unlawful for any prostitute, or any woman or girl notoriously abandoned to lewdness, to occupy, inhabit, sleep or live in any house, room or closet situated in the corporate limits of the town of Covington, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, whether as agent or owner, to rent, lease or hire any house, building or room to any woman or girl notoriously abandoned to lewdness, or for immoral purposes.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any woman or girl to frequent any barroom and drink therein.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to conduct any house of public entertainment or public resort, building or room, in which lewd dancing is permitted, or lewd pictures are accessible to view, or to establish or carry on a house of prostitution or assignation within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, La.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, That whenever a house situated within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, La., becomes dangerous to the public morals from the manner in which it is conducted, the Mayor, upon facts coming to his knowledge, order the occupants of such houses, building or room, to remove therefrom within a delay of five days by service of notice on such occupant in person or by posting the notice on the door of such house, building or room, to remove therefrom within a delay of five days, and upon such occupants failing to do so, they shall be punished as provided in Section seven of this ordinance.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, That in the event that the occupants of the house, building or room referred to in section five of this ordinance do not remove therefrom after the infliction of the penalty provided for in section seven, the Mayor is authorized to close the same and to place a policeman, or other officer, at the door to warn away all parties who shall undertake to enter.

Section 7. Be it further ordained, That any person or persons who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 8. Be it further ordained, That this ordinance shall become effective and be in full force on and after the first day of December, 1915. Adopted October 5, 1915. PAUL J. LACROIX, Mayor. L. A. PERREAND, Secretary.
